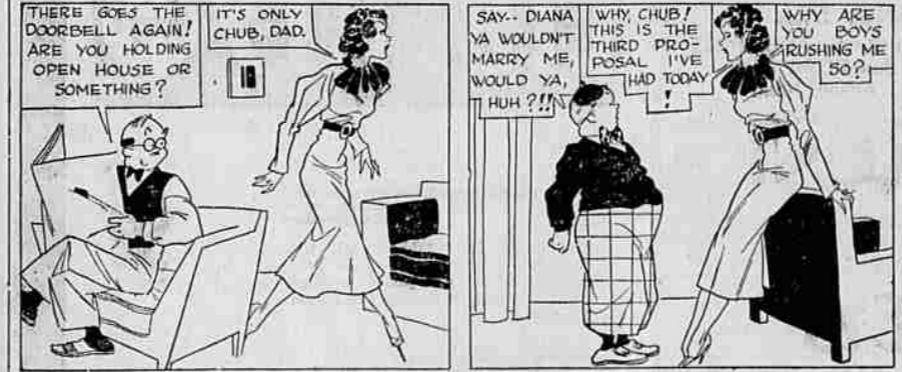

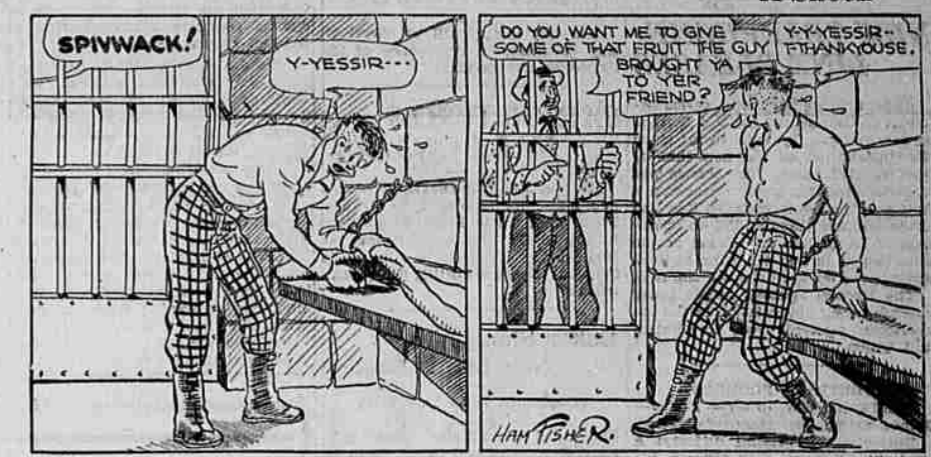

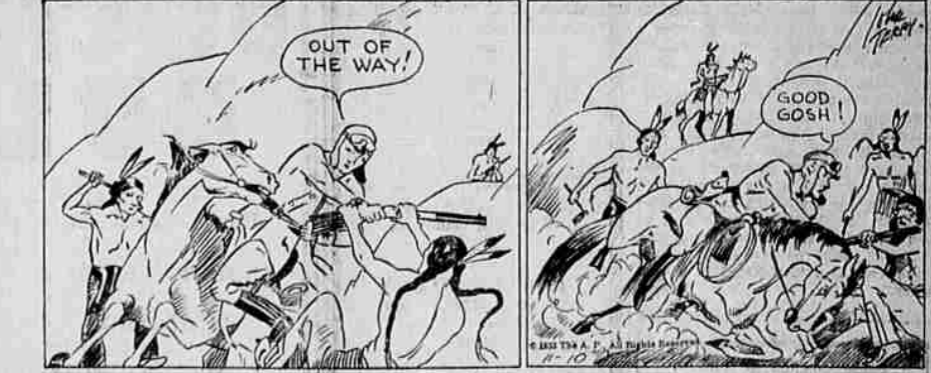

HOLDING, according to the football code of the rules committee, is unfair and eliminates skill. "The slowest man in the world could make a 40-yard run on every play if the rest of his teammates would hold their opponents long enough," the code says.

There are many ways the underhanded line-man can hold his opponent out of play with little chance of being seen. One of these is to circle the side of the opponent with the arm that is away from the referee, letting the other hang in a legal position, as shown in sketch. Another is to grasp a charging opponent underneath the thigh as he charges through, holding him just long enough to slow him up, and then letting him free.

These are only a few instances of holding, but they are probably the two most likely to be overlooked by the busy referee.
