Red Cross Roll Call Campaign Under Way

other members of the local chapter who have devoted many hours of their time to the production of garments for the destitute, or who have assisted in the distribution of flour. Statements have been made by the president of the United States as well as the governors of the states urging enrollment. The president's statement reads as follows: "When our people in any section of the country are faced with the perils and suffering which follow so swiftly in the wake of disaster, they look with one accord to the American Red Cross for instant and efficient relief. They have never looked in vain.

"Those of us who are willing to lend a helping hand in time of emergency to others less fortunate than ourselves, look to this great national relief agency as our representative in the hour of need. It does not disappoint us. It is an historic institution closely allied with your government, and its president is in all ways the president of the United States.

"Just now the Red Cross is asking every adult American to lend his or her support to Red Cross service through individual memberships. The records of the Red Cross are one we may all be proud of. In the past year sufferers of 117 disasters have been cared for. Five million families have benefited by distribution of relief materials. A million Americans have served as volunteers under the Red Cross banner.

"I earnestly urge you to respond most generously to the annual Red Cross roll call. We must do our part to keep the Red Cross ready, day or night, for service."

And the statement of the governor of the state of Oregon, Julius L. Meier, reads as follows:

"To the people of Oregon:—The annual nation-wide roll call of the American Red Cross will be conducted this year from Armistice day to Thanksgiving day.

"During the past years when widespread unemployment has brought hardship and suffering in its wake, the Red Cross has met greatly increased demands and responsibility with cheerful courage and efficiency.

"I hope that every citizen of Oregon who can possibly do so will respond to this annual appeal, knowing that every dollar invested in Red Cross membership will yield a large return in service."

Extremely high temperatures reaching 70 degrees were reported during the three-day open season. These high temperatures complicated the situation and made it most difficult to care for the meat.

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OREGON BUTTER IS PURCHASED BY ARMY IN MANILA

PORTLAND, Nov. 14 (AP)—Reflection of an Australian bid in favor of an Oregon proposal resulted in the sale of 111,000 pounds of Oregon butter to the United States army in Manila. The sale amounts to about \$35,000.

The sale was announced here Monday by interstate associated creameries, and the shipment will remove one-tenth of the state's butter surplus. The butter will move within two months.

Governor Meier and Congressman Martin had telegraphed the secretary of war and the quartermaster general requesting that Oregon producers be given the contract.
