

### INVITE KEARNS TO REFEREE AT BOXING TOURNEY

The man who managed Jack Dempsey to the world's heavyweights boxing championship, Jack Kearns, may be one of the third men in the ring when the curtain goes up on the Eagles great relief fund championship amateur boxing tournament at the Sacajawea hotel arena next Tuesday night, Charles Hildebrand of the Eagles announced today.

Kearns, who with Mickey Walker, is said to be en route to Reno where the two are to spend some time vacationing and Jack has been invited to come here to help work the wild hostilities Tuesday night. He is strong for giving the young fellows a chance to get started in boxing and is noted for donating time and money to charity. For these reasons officials of the Eagles are hopeful he may accept the invitation to call fistie balls and strikes on the warring ringmen next week.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 15 (AP)—Coach Howard Jones planned to give Southern California's football team a full dose of Oregon plays in another scrimmage session today as the Trojans settled down to what they hope will be the start of another winning streak.

Realizing that if they are to have any sort of chance of representing the west in the rose tournament game they must end the Oregon parade of victories, the Men of Troy were expected to put in another long hard afternoon of work.

Coach Jones spared no one yesterday in the first real scrimmage session the Trojans have had since early in the season. The first and third teams, each bolstered up as the practice went along, from the second and fourth squads, fought it out until dark last night, with a lot of hard tackling and blocking thrown in for good measure.

### Grant of Georgia Has Great Drive For 170-Pounder

ATHENS, Ga. (AP)—He's so fast the boys call him Cy, short for Cyclone. And gridiron fans in two North Georgia towns, Cornelia and Clark-

ville, have hot arguments over which shall claim him as a native son.

He is the leading scorer of the southeastern conference and his name is Joseph Arston Grant, a junior halfback on the University of Georgia's strong team.

As a sophomore he was a dash, tallying touchdowns almost every game and in his second year he has become the ace of the Georgia backfield.

Cy has remarkable drive for his 170 pounds and races like a thoroughbred horse. He has a long stride which sometimes makes it appear as if he is going slower than he really is. The deception works to his advantage, for it frustrates the timing of tacklers and he whizzes by them or pulls in a hip just as they dive.

Most of Grant's scores—and therefore the majority of Georgia's touchdowns—have come on long runs. Cy is the climax man. He makes as many 40-yard runs as 10-yard dashes.

With his flair for speed, Grant is at best on sweeping end runs and sharp cutbacks off tackle. Given traffic escort past the scrimmage line, Cy is as hard a man to stop as the south boasts. Georgia's interference and blocking are much better than last year and with a couple of burly advance men to clear the track, Grant steps on the accelerator and outruns the secondaries.

Hasn't Been Outkicked

But he is just as valuable to Georgia as a punter and defensive player as a ball-ticker. He averaged 48 yards against New York university, has a season average slightly under that figure and hasn't been outkicked this year.

Cy was no prep school sensation and he came to Georgia with nothing but cyclone speed, as the folks in the apple country call it. Two years of polishing has given Grant poise, a puzzling change of pace, and a fine idea of a defensive halfback's duties.

In the final round of a tournament that began last Wednesday Frank Rendon, Phil Abramson, Sidney Rusinow and Benjamin Feuer defeated Louis H. Watson, A. M. Barnes, Richard L. Frey and Sam Fry Jr. by 1,180 points at 100 boards.

All members of the winning quartet except Feuer conduct bridge clubs in New York.

ASHLAND, Ore., Nov. 15 (Special)—Big plans are afoot at the Southern Oregon Normal school here, in preparation for their annual home-coming, to be on November 17 and 18.

The biggest feature on their home-coming program is the long-awaited football game between the Sons and Eastern Oregon Normal. The Sons have been playing exceptional football this year, and those who have been following the two schools predict a real battle. ### CANADA'S LIQUOR CONTROL SYSTEMS NOT ALL SIMILAR

TORONTO (AP)—Canadian liquor control systems range from "most liberal" to "very strict," with the provincial governments holding a steady hand on the bottle neck.

Quebec is in the "most liberal" class, and at the other extreme comes Ontario. Other provinces have systems patterned after those of the two large central provinces and ranging between in strictness.

**Quebec Sell 'All Corners'**

In Quebec the government sells hard liquor in its own stores over the counter a bottle at a time to all corners, beer and light wines are sold in restaurants and hotels, and taverns cater to the straight beer drinkers. Beer also is sold in grocery stores and delivered to the householder's door on order.

The government commission sells Canadian, Scotch and Irish whiskies, all sorts of wines, liqueurs, brandies and so on. It imports only Guinness and Bass ale, the others being Canadian brands.

In 1921, the first year of operation, the commission made a profit of \$2,860,000. Profits rose steadily until \$9,000,000 was shown in the year ending May, 1930. Decline in the tourist trade as well as the economic slump cut profits to \$3,700,000 in the fiscal year 1932-33.

**Charities Get Share of Profits**

Each year the first million in profits go to public charities, and the balance is devoted to roads and education.

Ontario's system is at the other extreme, so far as drinking is concerned. It bans consumption of intoxicants of any form in any place other than a private residence or hotel room used as a residence.

No liquor can be purchased without a permit good for one year and costing \$2 for hard liquor and \$1 for beer and wine. Each purchase is entered on the permit at the time and forms a record which is frequently used in police court cases of bootlegging and drunken driving.

**Permit Plan Profitable**

Purchase of either spirits or beer are virtually unlimited, but abuses, however, are watched closely. The commission sells in government stores almost every kind of alcoholic beverage.

The permit system act, which went into effect in June, 1927, brought profits of \$10,000,000 in 1931, \$9,200,000 in 1932, and an estimated \$5,200,000 for 1933.

Of the nine Canadian provinces, only Prince Edward Island has prohibition. All others have some form of government sale.

The Scott act, passed by the Dominion, became law in Prince Edward Island in 1880 after plebiscites in three counties, and the entire province became dry, as it has been since with the exception of three years when Charlottetown, the capital, voted against the act under the local option clause, the rest of the province meanwhile remaining dry.

Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have systems similar to the two larger provinces. All provinces reap substantial profits from the sale of liquor.

**SEVERELY TAILORED SUIT WORN BY LILY DAMITA**

PARIS (AP)—Lily Damita, French motion picture actress, wears a Schiaparelli suit of blacksheep tweed. The suit, which is cut on the most severely tailored lines, is accompanied by a blouse of royal blue, ribbed silk.

### George Kelly Wins In Pocket Billiards

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 15 (AP)—George Kelly, 32-year-old Philadelphian, is national pocket billiard champion.

The red-haired Irishman captured the first national tourney last night by defeating William Mosconi, Philadelphia youngster, 125 to 98 in 29 innings.

### Edward N. Hurley Dies In Chicago

CHICAGO, Nov. 15 (AP)—An illness that became critical only a few hours before he was removed to a hospital caused the death of Edward N. Hurley, 69, one of the prominent men in the wartime history of the nation.

Besides the fame he gained as chairman of the United States ship-ping board during the World war, Mr. Hurley was president of the machine company bearing his name and served as co-receiver of the middlewest utilities company after the crash of the Insull utility empire.

**JUVENILE COMMUNISTS INCREASE**

MOSCOW (AP)—The young communists, juvenile branch of the communist party, reports that its membership in Russia this year is 4,547,000, compared with 2,042,000 in 1928 at the start of the first five-year plan. The organization has 135,000 "cells."

**BOSNIAN WHEAT PAYS BANKS**

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia (AP)—Unable to collect farm loans in cash, several Bosnian banks are accepting wheat in payment of debts at about 80 cents a bushel. The banks have opened storage warehouses.

**PU-YI SEES HIMSELF ACT IN HOME-MADE FILMS**

HSINCHING (AP)—Henry Pu-Yi, chief executive of Manchukuo, has become a movie fan.

He has installed in his palace here an American movie projector, and he also has purchased a movie camera.

He delights to watch himself on the screen playing tennis, receiving visitors or taking part in state ceremonies.

**PLANES DISPLACE GERMAN RAILS**

BERLIN (AP)—Trial of multi-motored planes for fast night freight service of the German federal railways was so successful that orders have been placed for machines to fly regularly on the Berlin-Koenigsberg route.

**GREEK CHURCH BANS MASONRY**

ATHENS (AP)—The Holy Synod of the Greek Orthodox church has ruled that no members of the church may be Freemasons. Priests who now belong to the order must renounce it or be unroofed.

**DAUGHTER OF SENATOR WEARS CORONET HAIR-DRESS**
