(Continued From Page One) oratic candidate for governor of New York to succeed Gov. Lehman, who, the News said, will not seek renomination. Through such an arrangement, the News said, it is hoped to circumvent the advantage gained by the rustonists in the recent election of Fiorello H. La Guardia as mayor of New York and to rebuild the Democratic machine in the city. The paper added that it apparently means the ouster of John J. Curry as the leader of Tammany hall.

NO FRICTION, REPORTS SAY WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—A new cabinet officer who says he will give unwavering support to President Roosevelt's gold-buying plan, and who is a close friend of a leading commodity dollar advocate, takes full control tomorrow of the treasury. But officials continued to deny vigorously that the resignation of Henry Morgenthau Jr., as undersecretary and the unlighted leave of absence granted to William H. Woodin, secretary, meant any schism between the latter and the president. The explanation remained that Woodin needed to go to Tucson, Ariz., in search of rest and health; that Dean Acheson, who had been undersecretary, resigned simply to let Morgenthau take the second-ranking position in the treasury so he could assume charge while Woodin was on leave.

President Roosevelt today designated William I. Myers, deputy governor of the farm credit administration, to succeed Morgenthau as the governor. Myers will take office as soon as Morgenthau is sworn in tomorrow. Myers, a former professor of agriculture economics at Cornell university, was brought to Washington by Morgenthau as his first assistant. WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Professor H. M. Groves of the University of Wisconsin, a supporter of former Governor Philip LaFollette, has been named chief tax advisor to the treasury.
