

Conrad H. Mann Will Serve Five Months In Jail

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—President Roosevelt issued a pardon for Conrad H. Mann, of Kansas City, soon after he began a sentence for violation of the lottery laws.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16 (AP)—A whirlwind of activity marked the end of a federal government campaign against alleged lotteries conducted by fraternal orders.

Conrad H. Mann, president of the Kansas City chamber of commerce, arrived in New York to surrender to federal authorities and, unless there is a last-minute intervention by President Roosevelt, to serve a five-month sentence on his conviction for participation in an alleged lottery by the order of Eagles.

An indictment pending against Senator James J. Davis of Pennsylvania, in connection with an alleged lottery by the Moose, was nolle prossed. Davis was acquitted on a similar charge October 12.

Bernard C. McGuire, convicted with Mann in the Eagles case, surrendered and was sent to Lewisburg, Penn., where there is a federal penitentiary. His sentence is a year and a day.

An indictment against the Western Union Telegraph company, involving charges that it was a factor in an alleged lottery conducted for the Shriners, was nolle prossed.

Lewis Mead Treadwell, youthful chief of the criminal division of the United States attorney's office, who was in charge of the prosecution of the cases, said that the developments cleared the courts of all cases involving the lottery campaign.

HIGHWAY BOARD LETS CONTRACTS

PORTLAND, Nov. 16 (AP)—The state highway commission yesterday by awarding contracts aggregating \$600,000 reduced the cost of highways to \$2,700,000. The balance will be used up according to budgets previously submitted to the federal government.

Speed in getting jobs under way to aid unemployment and to get the entire program under contract resulted in several adverse reactions as far as the commission was concerned. Hillsboro failed to secure a promised right of way and several bidders failed to produce bonds after being awarded contracts. These events culminated into two specific orders issued by Chairman Leslie M. Scott with the statement "this commission won't be trifled with."

The commission ordered that hereafter it will declare forfeited all certified checks of five per cent of the contract submitted by bidders in the event contractors cannot secure bonds. It also ordered no more jobs would be contracted until right-of-way matters have been settled.

BUTTER MARKET REMAINS STEADY

PORTLAND, Nov. 16 (AP)—Market on butter was being kept steady by the further purchases by the government on the proce exchange. Complaints against the practice of the government in limiting its purchases only to members of the exchange, have been made by the trade that is outside that organization, some of which are the heaviest producers and handlers of butter within this territory.

Claim was made that the restricting of sales to the produce exchange, gives that organization power to manipulate values to suit itself and shut out completely from governmental benefits all that do not pay tribute to the exchange through membership.
