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A. A. U. TO SCORN BERLIN OLYMPICS IF JEWS BARRED

By Foster Bailey Associated Press Sports Writer PITTSBURGH, Nov. 21 (AP) - The amateur athletic union, facing what may prove to be the most critical year of its history, today called on every branch of Chicago to pressure its president for another term. Brundage had planned to retire after holding the post since 1926, but the action of the union in voting to withhold its team from the 1936 Olympics at Berlin unless Germany removes its restrictions on Jewish athletes raised a momentous international question which he felt he should not be scorning.

Eastern Oregon Boxers Begin Battle Tonight

THEY WAY into the Sacjawaes hotel arena tonight to support their favorite amateur fighting men as they go to war for the Eastern Oregon championships at the Eagles here tonight. The first bout is to start at promptly 8:15 and the last bout is to end by 10:30.

The La Grande amateurs, all except a few who are to be weighed and stammered at 4:30 tonight at the arena, "passed in review" before the clerk of the arena and took their physical examinations at the office of Dr. Eugene Moon last night. The out-of-town boxers were being given their tests as they swooped into La Grande today.

Dr. Moon was high in his praise for the physical fitness he found the La Grande fighters in. Not a single one being turned down because of physical disability. "Such a record is one that the people of La Grande should rightfully feel proud of," Dr. Moon said today.

The local fighters are to report to the touring directors at the Sacjawaes arena at 4:30 tonight.

POWERFUL OUTSIDERS POURING INTO TOWN Best upon hammering their way to victory over the La Grande trunks tonight a legion of powerful out-of-town amateurs began pouring into town early today and were continuing to pour in appearance at present time. A block of 500 men in both the 11c and 11.10 sections has been kept out and is to go on sale at the arena tonight.

Harvard-Yale And Army-Navy Games Lead East's Menu

NEW YORK, Nov. 21 (AP) - Your two top-end-of-the-week eastern football fixtures usually seem to be that in a row at the stadium when Army plays Navy and Harvard collides with Yale but the schedule-makers have crossed them up this time. They'll be playing both games this Saturday, the one at Philadelphia, the other at Cambridge, leaving Mr. John H. Fair in a dilemma of considerable magnitude.

The removal of these two local rivals among the oldest and most spectacular of the sport, undoubtedly all other games on the eastern program.

Sport Slants

It's too bad that the Cadets and Tigers can't be brought together in a post-season battle, but it's probably just as well for Fritz Crain's jump-rover pupils that they be kept apart. The opposition among eastern centers who have seen both second round touchdowns better than Princeton. Comparative scores would indicate an even water margin.

Princeton undoubtedly has one of the great teams of its modern history in the making. The Tigers have proved it, but so has the Army, in addition to a smothering of Stanford.

RUSSIA STUDY ENGLISH

MOSCOW (AP) - The commissariat of education has ordered all secondary schools in Moscow, Leningrad and other leading cities to teach English or French and all village schools to offer at least one foreign language.

After pointing out that only a few such as Olyphant, Wilson, Gortchak and Cagle, were recognized football stars before entering Army, Olyphant concludes that the college themselves might well adopt the West Point standards of making all Cadets, whether football players or not, use the scholastic system.

There can't be anything like a permanent system with a long-time resident coach. The team must be headed by Army officers on duty at the Academy and Army officers, by federal regulation, must keep changing posts.
