Picks Faults In The Beauties Of Hollywood

NEW YORK (AP)—Despite all the publicity, Penrhyn Stanlaws, eminent portrait painter, is convinced that there is not one perfect screen beauty among Hollywood's stars. There would be if one of them had Lupe Velez's profile, Joan Bennett's facade and a boyish figure. Stanlaws would add a touch of lip stick, dancing and mascara. In 1922 Stanlaws lost his job as a Hollywood director because he spoke out in Hollywood's pulchritude. He spoke out again recently with no job to lose: Mae West: "Her head, eyes and mouth were constructed for a simple nose, but nature presented her with a complicated one — interestingly modeled, but bringing the eyes too close together." Katherine Hepburn: "Her chin and the lower part of her face project too far. Anthropologists have a name for such a facial type: they call it prognathism." Constance Bennett: "A real sympathy in jazz—her nose too small for her face." Greta Garbo: "She has a sleepy, sophisticated look, attained by deep eye sockets and a peculiar slant of the upper lip. These are not aids to beauty, but schoolgirls find the effect more alluring than beauty." Jean Harlow: "She has a graceful and expressive figure—between that of the 90's and the boyish form. Her face is the same type as Katherine Hepburn's, but more so, caused by her nose projecting at too sharp an angle." Lupe Velez's figure is the "true maidenly" one, he said, and her face is mobile so she "can look sophisticated or innocent at will." Ann Harding: "Fine symmetrical features—but so nearly approaching the classic type that repose of features is essential to beauty." Kay Francis: "Nicely-balanced features—head in fine proportion to the body—over-sized triceps of the arms." Mary Pickford: "There is no one in the films who has her sculptural modeling and harmony of features, Mary has it, however." Marlene Dietrich: "Take Mary Pickford's head, replace it with one slightly out of drawing, give her heavy eyelids and sunken eyes and you have Dietrich—a sophisticated Mary." Joan Crawford and Joan Blondell, Stanlaws said, have Mae West's unusually prominent features, but their "skull construction isn't large enough to carry them."

Search For Hart Continues Today

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 23 (AP)—Police, coast guardsmen, and naval officers searched the waters of San Francisco bay today for a human body reported floating off the eastern point at Yerba Buena Island, lying between San Francisco and Oakland. Officers expressed the belief the body might be that of Brooke L. Hart, wealthy San Jose merchant's son who was kidnaped and murdered two weeks ago. "Gabby" Street will be the San Francisco Mission baseball club's ninth manager since the club was formed in 1926.

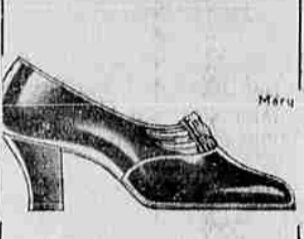
