Tommy Loughran Holds Off Giant Despite Cut Lip

NEW YORK, Nov. 23 (AP) — With the aid of one of the most surprising notions ever taken in a New York ring, Tommy Loughran, the veteran boxer from Philadelphia, has demonstrated that the young giant, Ray Impellitteri, isn't ready to become a heavyweight title contender yet.

The big moment of the battle, which otherwise was mostly a demonstration of Loughran's well known boxing skill, came in the ninth round. A right uppercut caught his mouth and cut it badly. Referee Pete Hartley wasted no time about halting the proceedings. After one look at the stream of blood pouring down Loughran's chest he raised Impellitteri's hand in token of victory.

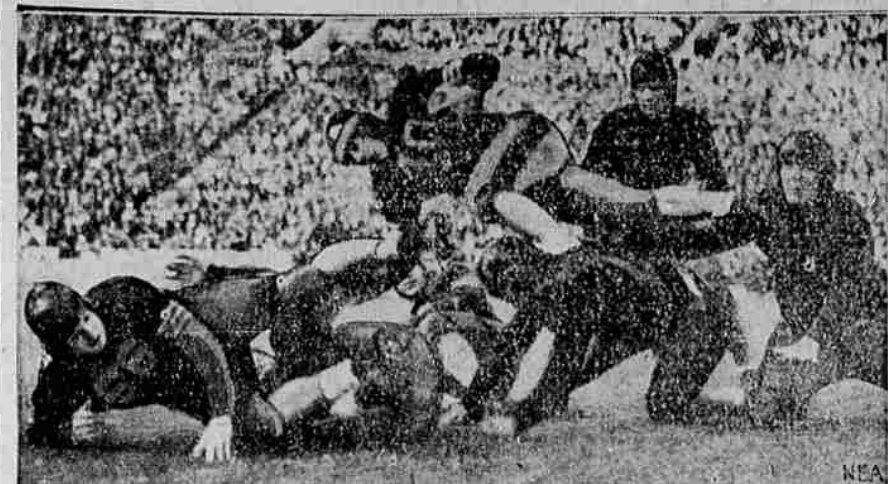

COUGARS ALL SET FOR THE HUSKIES

WASHINGTON STATE COLLEGE, Pullman, Nov. 23 — With the kick-off time advanced half an hour to 1:30 p. m., University of Washington and Washington State gridiron giants will line up here Saturday afternoon in the 27th football clash since athletic relations were opened in 1900. It will be the Cougar home-coming and a great throng of old grads and former students will be included in the crowd of 15,000 or more that will attend the northwest classic.

Coach Babe Hollingbery has been carefully perfecting his plans for two weeks. More drive and punch in his

running attack has been the chief object of the work sessions. Hollingbery, his assistant, Buck Bailey, and three of the players watched Washington defeat U. C. L. A. 10-0 last week and they report that Jimmy Pheilan has an unusually strong team that gains power as it goes along. While the sharpshooting aerial attack with Phil Sorboe, All-American candidate for quarterback, on the firing end will form perhaps the chief offensive threat of the Cougars, Hollingbery plans to have his fast running backs, and his hard smashing backs at their best in order to present a diversified attack. Ways and means of throttling Big Bill Smith, University of Washington's All-American end prospect who shines at carrying the ball and goal kicking, have been an important part of the Cougar defensive practice.

CHAMPIONSHIP BATTLES SET FOR TONIGHT

La Grande was dished up last night when Adam Leighton, La Grande, defeated Lowell Hutchinson, Union, in three rounds of gory and torrid fighting. What a fight! What a fight! From the sound of the first bell until the gong ended their hostilities this pair of warring ringsters tore into each other like wildcats. Hooking, jabbing, swinging, and otherwise man-mauling each other Leighton and Hutchinson rained terrific punches on each other, with Adam gaining the

verdict amid the excitement of the crowd.

So vicious and furious was the Leighton-Hutchinson struggle that the spectators went home talking to themselves commenting on the merits of the two boys. The fight was so close that Hutchinson was reinstated. Another spectacular fight last night was that in which Gerald Butcher, La Grande, fought his way within a notch of the lightweight title by flattening Toby Berry, Union, in thirty-seven seconds of wild-eyed mulling. Butcher stands a good chance of gaining the crown tonight but he will have to fight hard to win it.

Leslie Sullivan, of La Grande, who stopped Charley Zigler in the second round last night, may press Butcher hard to win the title tonight. Wesley Worthey of North Powder and Dave Oliver of Wallowa also will be in there after the lightweight championship tonight and each expects to defeat Butcher and Sullivan. It will be a merry mixup. Zigler waged a sizzling battle against Sullivan, but could not stand up under Leslie's fistie fire.

With his eyes trained on Stanley Bessey, who conquered Big Jess Phillips for the heavyweight title tonight, Bill Mann of Baker punched out a decision over Bill Zirkovich, La Grande, in last night's heavyweight bout. The fight was close with Mann remaining out in front all the way. Mann feels he will knock out Bessey for the title tonight.

So close was the verdict in the Bobby Brack-Jimmy Jennings flyweight encounter, which went to Jennings, that tourney chieftains reinstated Brack into the meet and he, too, will be seen in action again tonight.
