George Edward Duke, 68 years of age, father of Miss Bess Duke, society reporter for the Observer, died at his home at Eugene Tuesday evening, according to word received here today.

Miss Duke left La Grande Saturday evening upon receiving word of her father's critical condition. The message at that time stated that he had suffered another stroke following some months of invalidism.

Mr. Duke was born in Diersburg, Tenn., Nov. 11, 1865, and in 1903 he married Miss Imogene Waldrop, who preceded him in death four years ago. The couple moved to Eugene from Twin Falls, Idaho, in 1924.

Survivors include twin sons, George R. and Edward V. of Eugene; three daughters, Eula and Marthell, of Eugene, and Bess Duke of this city; two brothers, J. Robert Duke and Henry R. Duke, of Texas; four sisters, Mrs. J. D. Scarborough and Mrs. W. K. Strother, of Texas; Mrs. Eula B. McMahan, of Compton, Cal., and Mrs. R. C. Bush, of Muskogee, Okla.

This opinion had been expressed by Dr. O. M. W. Sprague in resigning Tuesday as special financial adviser to the treasury.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—Paying little outward heed to the vehement controversy over monetary policy, the administration proceeded with its gold program today, holding the price of domestic price of the metal at the same level as yesterday.

The quotation was \$33.76 per ounce. The world price was \$33.96 at the opening London foreign exchange quotation of \$3.40 1/2 to the pound. The dollar later improved, carrying the London gold quotation down to \$33.80.

SLASHING OF EGG PRICE CONTINUES

PORTLAND, Nov. 23 (AP)—General slashing of egg prices on the open market which finally forced local eggs to loosen their price by at least a dozen was not terminated by such action.

In fact open declines in the price only served to stimulate depression in the trade. Slashing continued with sales of fresh cut as much as 2 cents dozen below established values. While most of the severe cutting was reported by small operators and chiefly nearby country stores, it has become practically impossible to force more than a nominal volume of sales at the extreme values.

Out-state operators were reported as slashing values generally which again upsets the local trade.
