

BUS FARES WILL BE REDUCED ON DECEMBER FIRST

The biggest single reduction ever made in bus fares will go into effect Dec. 1, throughout the entire system of Interstate Transit Lines and Union Pacific Stages, according to the statement issued today by E. J. Condon, traffic manager. These drastic fare cuts will affect all cities from Chicago to Pacific Coast points which are now served by this bus system.

"These new fares are substantially lower than have ever before been offered by a dependable travel company," said Mr. Condon, "in some cases reductions amount to as much as 50 per cent. The new reduced rates apply both to local and trans-continental travel."

Mayors and civic bodies of the cities served by Interstate Transit Lines and Union Pacific Stages have voiced their enthusiastic approval of the new fare reductions. It is felt that the new low fares will increase the volume of travel from town to town, as well as transcontinental travel, thus benefiting merchants, hotel men and shop keepers in cities

GERMAN POLICY SEEN AS THREAT TO UNION JACK

LONDON (AP)—Demands for Britannia to rule the waves as of yore are being voiced here in many quarters as a result of Germany's withdrawal from the disarmament conference.

Admirals, past and present, and politicians—the latter, however, not without an eye on the nation's budget—have joined in the cry for building up the British fleet.

Beatty's Warning Blunt
Two prominent voices have been raised for the cause, Admiral Sir Ernie Chatfield, the first sea lord, and Lord Beatty, war-time hero, who see in Britain's present position the need for action.

"The nation must take stock of its defense position," says Sir Ernie Chatfield, "and consider whether on its present naval expenditure it is maintaining a naval strength in accordance with its policy."

Admiral Beatty goes further, describing the navy as "the handmaiden of our foreign policy," he said to the Navy League:

"Without a strong navy we are of no use to anybody and we cannot play our part as a great power."

Lord Beatty supports the movement for smaller—but more—battleships.

"The United States wants larger ships," he said. "The British Empire wants many ships. Why? Because we have far greater responsibilities on the sea than any other country."

He called the British acceptance at the 1930 London naval conference of 50 cruisers, on a parity with the United States, a "grave and deplorable blunder."

"It is not the parity with the United States that I cavil at," he said. "If she wants as many as we do, why not? But the acceptance of 50 to do the work required of 70 was a grave and deplorable blunder."

He termed it "a matter of interest and grave concern" that the personnel of the United States navy represents a 60 per cent increase over 1914, that of Japan a 74 per cent increase, while Britain has reduced her personnel by 35 per cent.

When this was announced in parliament recently there were cries of "Shame!" from conservative benches. Sir Ernie Chatfield, while stressing the necessity for a national stock-taking, nevertheless finds many things in the British navy of which he is proud.

"The fuel consumption per horsepower hour, at full power, has been reduced for all types of ships by approximately one-third of that of war designs, he says.

In the case of battleships and cruisers, the machinery weights have been cut 20 to 30 per cent. The destroyer "Acheron," fitted with supercharged heavy oil engines, achieved the feat of halving the fuel consumption of its war-time sisters, the lowest of any steam-driven warship.

He Is Governor Moeur To State —But Just Doc To War Veterans

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Every Saturday afternoon Gov. Benjamin B. Moeur's office in the capitol ceases to be the executive seat of the state government.

It is then that a worn kit bag comes out of his desk and the 64-year-old governor becomes the self-appointed physician to the state of Arizona, with disabled war veterans his special commission. These weekly clinics are free.

Having packed a medicine kit 37 years, Dr. Moeur found the habit strong after his election to the governorship. So, though he turned over the greater part of his practice to his son, he continued to minister to war veterans needing help to back up claims for compensation.

The veterans remember the governor as the doctor who used to ride horseback over deserts to care for their fathers and mothers before them and who used to give pills with advice to the students of Teachers' college at Tempe—the same physician who once rode across a chasm at a dam site in a cable bucket to reach the bedside of a woman at a lonely ranch.

To them he remains, not Governor Moeur, but "Doc Moeur of Tempe."
