(Continued From Page One) plan were presented at an executive session of the committee by Frank A. Spencer, long connected with the wholesale grocery business. Spencer said Oregon would need \$900,000 annual to operate liquor stores, predicated on Canadian figures. However, \$500,000 or even less would suffice if stocks were turned over rapidly, he said. This would furnish and stock 50 stores. Spencer scouted the possibility that the state could buy liquor without cash payment. "No one can sit here and guarantee that liquor will be available at the start," he said. "If it cannot be obtained, liquor control would be on the rocks and in bad with the people from the start." Large assortments of liquor would be necessary, he said. Under present statute, it was declared, the state of Oregon cannot pledge the state's credit for liquor purchases. As a financing possibility, the committee discussed withholding permit money for six months or a year before turning it over to the counties as provided in the proposed legislation.

Gold Price Shows No Change Today

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—The administration held domestic gold price unchanged today at \$37.70 an ounce, 93 cents higher than the value of the metal at London on a basis of the opening sterling rate of \$0.19 to the pound.

Western Oregon Turkeys Shipped

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 25 (AP)—Two carloads of turkeys, gathered from Western Oregon points, left Roseburg this morning bearing 3579 birds, totaling 40,955 pounds, consigned to Los Angeles and San Francisco markets. The shipment is made by the Oregon Turkey Growers association, which has advanced 10 cents per pound to growers on prime grades, 8 cents on choice, and 5 cents on commercial grades.
