

CHAS. BLYSTONE DIES SUNDAY AT HIS HOME HERE

Charles Henry Blystone, long time resident of La Grande, died at his home at 8:15 o'clock Sunday morning, following an illness of two weeks. Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Snodgrass and Zimmerman mortuary with Rev. Paul Mortimer, of the Christian church, officiating. Burial will take place in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Mr. Blystone was 73 years, 19 days of age, being born at Neogo, Shelby county, Ill., Nov. 7, 1860. He was married to Margaret Lockhart of Neogo Dec. 11, 1889. Of this union five children were born, two of whom preceded him in death.

Survivors include his widow and three daughters, Mrs. W. R. Fletcher and Mrs. Earl J. Wood, of Portland, and Mrs. Joe Harrison, of La Grande, also two grandchildren, Miss Valerie Harper, of Portland, and Kenton Beveridge, of Union.

Mr. Blystone came to Oregon from the east in the fall of 1901, making his home in La Grande since then. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge for 27 years and was well known in La Grande and vicinity.

there was no further attempt to interfere with officers, who used tear gas when the mob took the two from jail.

The lynching, occurring only a few hours after the torn body of young Hart, son of a wealthy San Jose merchant, had been taken from San Francisco bay, climaxed a spectacular battle between officers barricaded in the jail and the determined mob.

Not an arrest was made. The only shots that were fired, with the exception of the charges from tear gas and bombs, were two that signalled the start of the attack on the jail.
