Finally, 84 man-days were spent in fighting forest fires and numerous small jobs such as clearing and fire-proofing public camp grounds, burning brush and building bridges and culverts were done.

All of this work with the exception of the fire-fighting, was planned work, contemplated and estimated for eventual accomplishment even before the C. C. C. camps were authorized. It was not "made work" simply to give the young men jobs.

The reason no trees were planted, was because by the time camps were established early last summer it was too late for this work. However, 800,000 trees are being planted in the Columbia national forest this fall.

Mr. Irwin also reports that the boys have shown marked improvement both physically and sociologically from a man-building standpoint. Much of the credit for this is given the army and navy officers who were in charge.

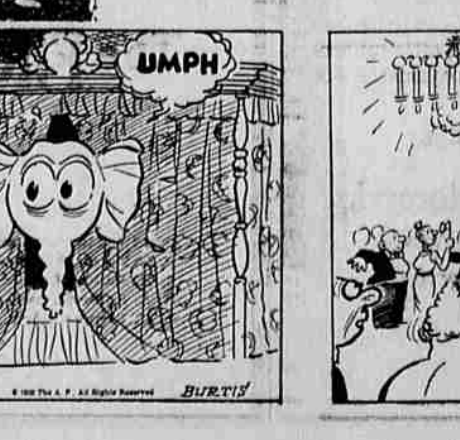

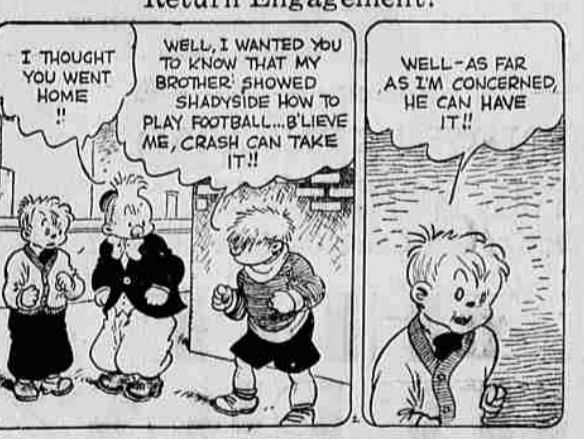
