ability of another allocation of federal funds at that time to continue the work longer. Every man, however, he pointed out, is expected to work, and foremen have the right to dismiss any man not doing his part.

Projects to receive the most favor should provide 80 per cent for labor and only 20 per cent for materials, he said.

Carlson also explained that a man must show six months continuous residence in a county to receive C. W. A. work there. The first 168 in this county are taken from the relief rolls, the next group from the re-employment agency, with war veterans with dependents given preference.

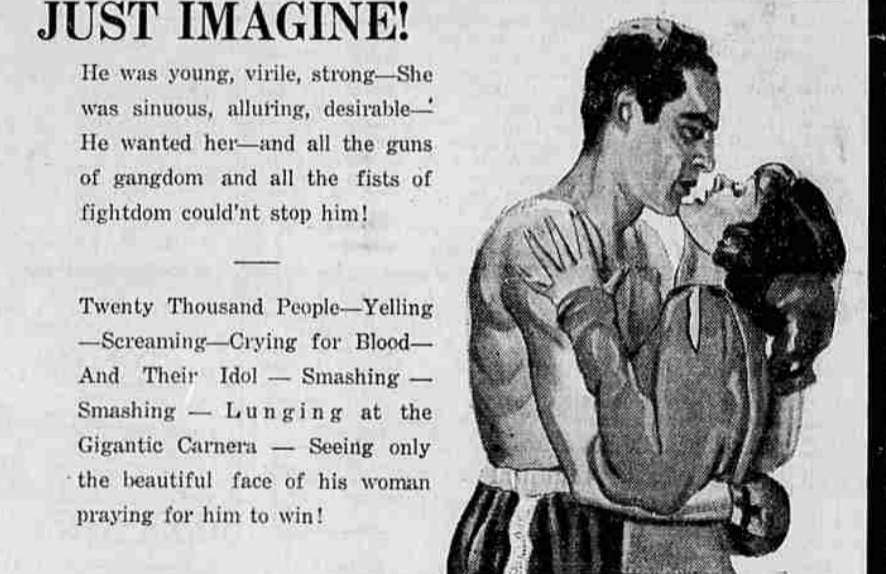
