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church of which he is the president. President Grant, accompanied by Apostle Melvin J. Ballard, both of Salt Lake City, were in La Grande yesterday and attended two services at the L. D. S. tabernacle before going to the Union for the dedication of the new church there.

Both Mr. Grant and Mr. Ballard presented addresses on the doctrine of the church.

For a considerable number of years Mr. Grant has been active in the church that is this year observing the 103rd anniversary of its founding. The Mormons came to the Salt Lake valley in 1846 and 10 years later Mr. Grant was born there. The pioneer hardships were still remembered vividly at the time of his birth.

Since that time the church has grown until at present it has 600,000 members all over the world. Mr. Grant recently returned from Washington, D. C. where he officiated at the dedication of a new church there. Marble to line the building was taken from Salt Lake valley to Washington.

Heading the activities of 1000 wards from Canada to Mexico takes up practically all of Mr. Grant's time and he is only able to devote a short time each day to reading the newspapers. Since he is not perfectly versed in national affairs and has not the time to make a conscientious study of the national recovery act he yesterday refused to comment on it except to express the hope that it will succeed.

Mr. Pierce, who is now a representative to congress, operated for a few years but was forced to close down.

U. P. Bus Brings Message of Fare Reduction Here

In connection with their campaign to inform the public of greatly reduced bus fares, a special Union Pacific bus equipped with a powerful broadcasting system, visited La Grande today. City Manager A. McAllister, granted permission to the special sound bus to broadcast the story of the Union Pacific Stages fare reductions in down town sections. "These reductions in fares are certain to stimulate travel," said Mr. McAllister, "and that means a direct benefit to all our local merchants. It will mean an increase in trade to towns all along the bus system and put new money in circulation."

According to E. G. Stout, Union Pacific Stages official, in charge of the special publicity crew traveling with the broadcasting bus, this is one of three buses fitted with sound equipment with which the company is covering the entire system. In addition a special newspaper advertising campaign is being used as a part of this intensive drive to tell the public about the new fare reductions. The new fare reductions apply to both local and transcontinental travel and the reductions amount to as much as 50 per cent in some cases.

The Union Pacific Stages operate the shortest, fastest bus route between Pacific coast points and Chicago, Mr. Stout said.
