SENTENCED TO LIFE TERM
ROSEBURG, Ore., Dec. 6 (AP)—A life sentence in Oregon state prison was imposed here last yesterday in connection with the slaying last Wednesday of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Amanda Serder.

The defendant unable to speak English, waived grand jury action and Circuit Judge B. L. Eddy passed sentence immediately.

Serder shot the woman to death after the two and Louise Serder, his brother, had quarreled bitterly over a period of many weeks.

IDAHO CONVICTS ESCAPE
BOISE, Ida., Dec. 6 (AP)—State and county officers were searching early today for two escaped convicts who slipped quietly from the Eagle Island prison farm sometime during the night.

The men are Alfred Minder, 28, sent up from Ada county in September, 1932, to serve one to 14 years for grand larceny, and Albert Marner, 25, of Moscow, serving 12 years to life for robbery.

Marner was received Nov. 24, 1930. Both were trusties.

KILLED BY TRUCK
SALEM, Dec. 6 (AP)—Albert Baker, 21, was killed when a truck in which he was riding overturned near here yesterday. He is survived by a wife and two children, one three weeks old.

Harry Turner, driver of the truck, was badly injured. State police said Turner told them he was forced off the road by an oncoming car.
