LONDON (AP)—Fred Perry, England's tennis giant killer, retains his position as the country's best player in the official ranking list for 1933 of the Lawn Tennis association.

A tottering figure in 1932, he placed his feet firmly on the crest this year by his conquest of Jack Crawford, Ellsworth Vines, Wilmer Allison and Henri Cochet in Paris and his victory over Crawford in the finals of the American championship.
