SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 22 (AP)—Brought together under the banner of charity, some of the greatest college stars of the 1933 season will match their football brilliancy here...

The ninth game to be played for the benefit of the Shriner's crippled children's hospital in San Francisco will bring together two squads described by rival coaches as "the best balanced teams" ever assembled for this purpose.

All American luminaries of the season just completed, not the line-up of the eastern squad coached by Andy Kerr of Colgate and Dick Hanley of Northwestern. Names of equally famed trouper of the gridiron are listed in the western group that will take orders from Orin E. "Babe" Hollingsbery of Washington State college and Percy Lacey of Denver university.

Erwin Rudolph, Of Clevelands, Wins Cue Championship

CHICAGO, Dec. 22 (AP)—Erwin Rudolph, of Cleveland, who gave up the study of the violin to concentrate on billiards, today was back as ruler of pocket billiard players for the fourth time.

The Clevelander, who decided between music and billiards at the age of 15, last night regained the title he lost in 1931, by downing Andrew Praz, of Philadelphia, 125 to 113 in 16 innings. With the title went \$1,600 in prize money, a diamond-studded medal and a share of the receipts. Rudolph also won the 1927 and 1930 tournaments.

The selling prices finally closed at 18 cents extreme for hens and 17 cents for toms.

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NO CHANGES IN BUTTER MARKET

PORTLAND, Dec. 22 (AP)—White demand for freshly churned butter has increased materially since the government eased up its purchasing, there was much less call for storage goods. There was no change in prices. Trading in the egg market was considered about steady with a liberal increase during the last few days in consumptive call. The demand was chiefly for fresh goods. There was a scarcity of roasting fowls and capons and prices on these were firm. Ducks were scarce. Geese have been in fair supply and prices not so firm.
