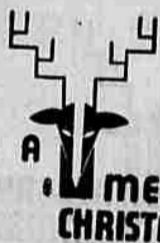

Latest Paris Basques Flare At Hipline

By Rita Ferris (Associated Press Fashion Editor) PARIS (AP) - Pert basques give accent to the hiplines of new clothes which Maggy Rouff designs for mid-season and advance spring wear.

The flared effects, placed over a slender hip, accent a line which designers have held on an ultra slim silhouette for several years. Thus comes a hint of the style trends to be seen later in smart Parisian gatherings and in promenades along the Champs Elysees.

Flaring Basques Notable Suits of heavily ribbed ottoman silk and velvet fashioned for late winter and early spring wear are designed with hip jackets having flared basques just over the hip bones, while both afternoon and evening frocks display a similar line.

One black moire afternoon dress with a high collar lined in cloth of gold has a trim basque bodice and a dark green fallie evening gown has hip flares of dark green and gold lame.

Black Lynx On Collar A multi-season suit of black ottoman has basques made of the same fabric, slightly stiffened and placed just above the hipbone. Black lynx is used on the collar, and a black feather tips the hat of black felt.

Fur gives the basque accent to early spring coats of black and sand colored wool. Fox is twisted down the front of the bodice, back of the arm and forward over the hipbones like a double question mark to form both collar and pockets.

Other Hip Accents Seen Tendency to accent the hips slightly is seen in a number of designers' collections. Patch pockets appear just over the hip bones on some sports frocks, while a diagonal line of buttons accents others.

And to prove that there's no lack of variety along the Rue de la Paix, several dressmakers accent the back of the hips of evening gowns with a fan frill or a cascade of ruffles.

EMOTIONAL CONTAGION

By Brooke Peters (Church) One of the difficulties of the present day freedom of children from interference and influence is that the independence which we have aimed for is not and cannot be possible.

It is not in the nature of human beings to keep their hands off the next fellow, especially if they can attain a feeling of power by their example or teaching.

The parent who sends his or her small child out to experience life in the world of his contemporaries must face the fact that the child will meet all kinds of children from all kinds of homes, and will inevitably have ideas put into his head which may or may not be desirable. In no case will he be left to follow his own road.

One of the most unfortunate features of the system is the over-protectiveness of children who are scarcely out of the nursery, and should still be playing dolls or tin soldiers.

There is always some small girl or boy who will start the idea of "being sweet on someone," and like a disease the fever will creep through the class, until in self defense the smallest boys and girls will be casting sheep's eyes and writing notes.

Parents and teachers are sometimes not free of blame, for to many of them the picture of little children playing at being in love is "cuddling," and they will talk about "your little sweetheart" and encourage their precocious sentimentality.

Up to high-school age it is far healthier for boys to look down on girls and for girls to scorn boys as nuisances. If they play together it should be as equals, with no quarter taken or given. The time will come naturally soon enough when both boys and girls awake to the fact that a complete world holds both men and women.

GOVERNMENT TO TACKLE PROBLEM OF CROP CONTROL

WASHINGTON - Appointment of Chester Davis as AAA administrator to replace George Peek will mean, it is believed here, that the administration will tackle with renewed vigor the problem of crop control.

Davis is known to regard this as one of agriculture's fundamental problems. Marketing agreements and codes are helpful, but in his opinion are not necessarily a controlling factor.

This was the root of the controversy between Peek and the professors which led to Peek's retirement as administrator to take over another job.

As the farm bill was drawn, the AAA administrator, acting for the president through his secretary of agriculture, has a choice of several courses and wide latitude.

The professors were for applying regulations for reduction of acreage at the start. Peek was for going more gradually into action. He held to a modification of the old equalization fee idea for which he had fought so hard when the McNary-Haugen farm bill was before congress.

Long-Standing Difference In other words, he favored an arrangement by which a percentage of total crops annually would be marketed eligible to receive the bounty on produce raised for domestic consumption, the remainder to be sold at the world price. This percentage would be applied to the yield on every farm.

Differences between the Peek and the opposing faction at first were described as "amicable disagreements" and "friendly divergencies of opinion." As far back as May, press reports describing a conference at the White House noted that their viewpoints were not reconciled, and the president sent the groups away with a request that they "get together."

The breach steadily widened, however, to such an extent that Mr. Roosevelt finally had to intervene.

Davis at this time was serving under Peek as director of the division of production. He and Peek not only were close personal friends but had been business associates. Secretary Wallace also was his friend.

His efforts toward attempting a reconciliation between the two factions earned for him the sobriquet among newspapermen and others as the "Henry Clay of the AAA." Some credit him with having delayed the climax of the feud until now.

It finally resolved itself to where he was forced to disagree with one friend and agree with another. He threw his support to Wallace.
