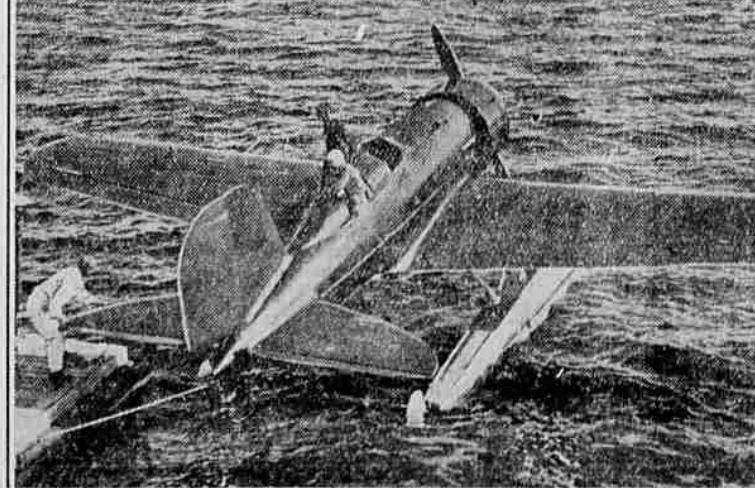
Northern Californians shivered in sub-normal temperatures today as valley fogs gave way to clear, cold weather. The mercury dropped to 39 degrees in San Francisco.
