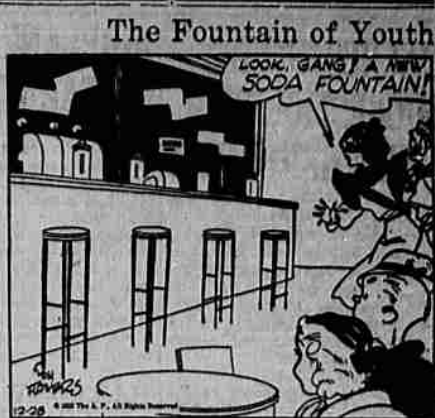
IMBLER HIGH HAS PROGRAM

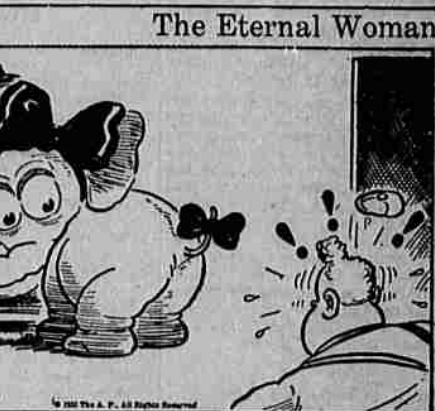
GOLD PRICE UNCHANGED
