

COACHES STUDY SUGGESTIONS FOR NEW GRID RULES

CHICAGO, Dec. 27 (AP)—Any hopes that college football will provide more and bigger thrills in 1934, depended a good deal today on what recommendations for changes in the rules, the American Football Coaches' association might make.

Seven proposed alterations in the playing code were presented at the opening session yesterday by Harry G. Kipke of the University of Michigan. After sleeping on them, the coaches promised to decide today on what they would recommend to the rules committee which will meet in New York some time in February.

The proposals included elimination of the "dead ball" rule, changing the fumble rule to permit running with the ball, making only fourth down incomplete forward passes into the end zone touchbacks, moving the goal posts up to the goal line, increasing the sideline yardage from 10 to 15 yards, permitting forward passing from anywhere behind the scrimmage line, and adopting a "windy day" rule to permit a team to surrender possession of the ball when back of its own 20 yard line, at a point 25 yards up the field, instead of punting.

have set down tentative budget estimates reading: income \$3,400,000,000, ordinary outgo \$2,600,000,000.

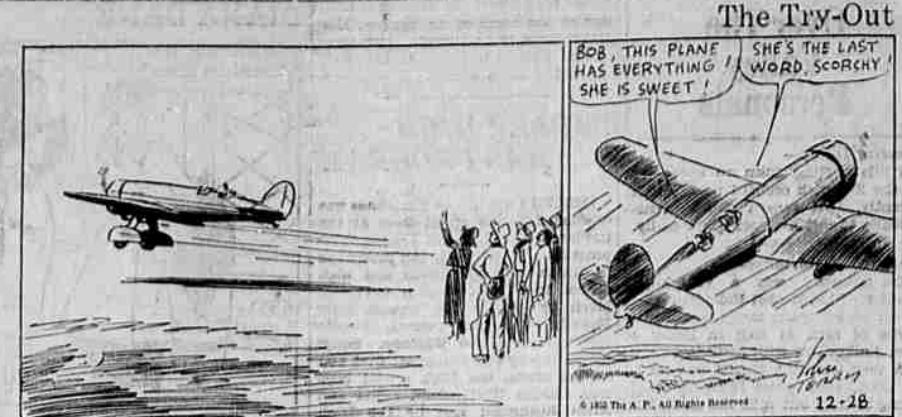
Senator Connally (D., Tex.) said today after a call at the White House he would move to include cattle as a basic commodity under the agriculture adjustment act.

Haines Canaries Take Many Prizes In Recent Shows

HAINES—A roller canary hatched last spring at the aviaries of Frank Lajoy in Haines tied as champion of the Rose City Roller Canary show in Portland last Friday in competition with 105 singers at the show. The young songster not only tied with an old bird for this honor but was given what is said to have been the highest score—65—ever awarded at

any show in the United States. Because an exhibitor may buy a good mature singer, the rules are that a young bird winning such honors is awarded the derby, the highest distinction a breeder may obtain.

Besides the above awards, Lajoy secured first for the best young team; first for best young bird, winning a beautiful silver trophy given the show by the U. S. National bank of Portland; first prize, special put up by Meier & Frank, for special tour; second for the best young team, and three third prizes.

Mr. Lajoy also sent birds to other northwest shows, and at Salt Lake he was given two medals, special prizes; and one third prize; at the Oakland, Cal., show the Lajoy birds won first for the best old team, second and fourth for the best bird of that show and a glucke special.

He won two trophies at Sacramento, Cal., show, which was given prior to the Portland affair, the latter which Mr. and Mrs. Lajoy attended, returning to Haines Monday, after en-

joying the four days' exhibit at the Benson hotel and a banquet Sunday given for the members of the Rose City association.

Mr. Lajoy has reared and trained birds for a number of years, securing his original stock from the best strain he could purchase in England, and his success is amply attested by the dozens of trophies, medals and fib-

bons that are treasured at the Lajoy home, which may in time need a special room to properly display these evidences of a skill in training canary rollers.
