JURORS BEHAVED BADLY. OLD RECORDS POINT OUT GREENUP, Ky. (AP) — It seems the court jurors of Kentucky's pioneer days sometimes made a lark of their task with resulting conduct contrary to judicial dignity.

Deputy Clerk Woodridge Spears dug into Greenup circuit court records of 1805 the other day and found this tidbit: "The grand jury charged the petty jurors were often drunk and the state of intoxication made them incapable of performing their duties with propriety."

CHICAGO (AP) — Sex education, as a means of solving many of the difficulties of marriage and relationships between men and women, has failed, the American Student Health association has been told by Dr. Elizabeth Whitney, consultant in mental hygiene at Stanford university.

"There is more unhappiness in marriage and more confusion in relationship between men and women than ever before," she said.

She deplored the movement for general sex education, declaring it
