WOMEN HELP IN 'BUYING' DRIVE DURING YEAR '33

By Sigrid Arne WASHINGTON (AP)—Women moved into a position of greater importance in the national machinery last year, women leaders believe, due to the force of circumstances in the drive against the depression.

Women showed an awakened civic consciousness that was miraculous, says Mrs. Grace Mopson Poole, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

For the first time home women realized they are an important cog in the national machinery. They swung into action rapidly behind the NRA program.

Women Can Control "In most cities it was the women's clubs that distributed the pledges to buy with the Blue Eagle. The drive made them realize that through their control of the family budget they can also control, in large part, the economic trend of the nation."
