Anniversary To Be Observed By C. E. Societies

Plans for commemorating the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the first Christian Endeavor society in Oregon, at the state convention at Salem April 19-22 were made at the mid-year meeting of the state executive committee, held in Portland during the weekend, according to members in attendance from here.

Among the interesting announcements made during the sessions was that Dr. Daniel A. Poling, of New York, president of the International Society of Christian Endeavor and the World's Christian Endeavor movement, will be the main speaker at the convention. This announcement was received with a great deal of enthusiasm and one of the largest conventions ever held in Oregon is being planned for.

The mid-year meeting in Portland was exceptionally well attended, there being present 13 of a possible 18 district union presidents from the various parts of the state. Of the remaining state officers, only two were absent from the meetings. Miss Helen McWay, of Oregon City, president of the state union, presided over all sessions.

Three pre-convention contests will be held over the state during the next three months, with final judging at the state convention in Salem. The intermediate department will sponsor a playlet contest, the playlet to present historical facts relative to the organization, history or progress of Christian Endeavor. The young people's department will hold an oratorical contest and the publicity department a poster contest.

Members of the state executive committee from La Grande are Dr. J. L. McPherson, evangelistic superintendent, Miss Hulda Anderson, life-work recruit superintendent and Katherine Moran, president of Grande Ronde Union.

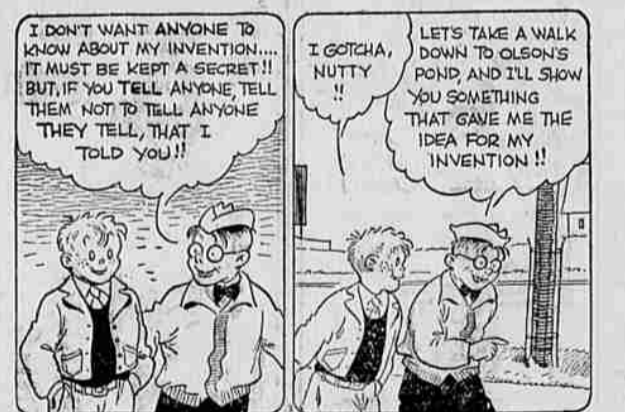
Annual Meeting Of Newspapermen At Eugene, Ore.

EUGENE, Ore.—The NRA code for newspaper publishers and for the printing establishments, a topic deemed of great interest to the public as well as to those directly concerned, will be the chief subject of the sixteenth annual Oregon press conference, to be held at the school of journalism at the University of Oregon, January 18, 19 and 20, it was announced here by Eric W. Allen. A complete report on the code and how it applies is expected to be given those present by Arne G. Rae, field manager for the Oregon State Editorial association, who is expected back by that time from a national meeting soon to be held in Chicago to discuss all angles of the NRA provisions as approved by President Roosevelt.

Conference officials hope to bring R. C. Sittler, publisher of the Humboldt Star, Winnemucca, Nevada, here to talk on the code. Mr. Sittler is a director of the National Editorial association, and it is planned to have him come here direct from the Chicago code meeting. Another out-of-state expert, Floyd L. Sparks of San Francisco, is also expected to be present and talk on "Advertising Under the New Deal." "The Regulation Situation for 1934" will be the topic of O. C. Harn, managing director of the Audit Bureau of Circulation, Chicago.

Merle R. Chesman, Astoria, publisher of the Astorian-Budget, president of the conference, will preside at the meeting. George S. Turnbull, secretary of the conference since its beginning 16 years ago, will also be present.

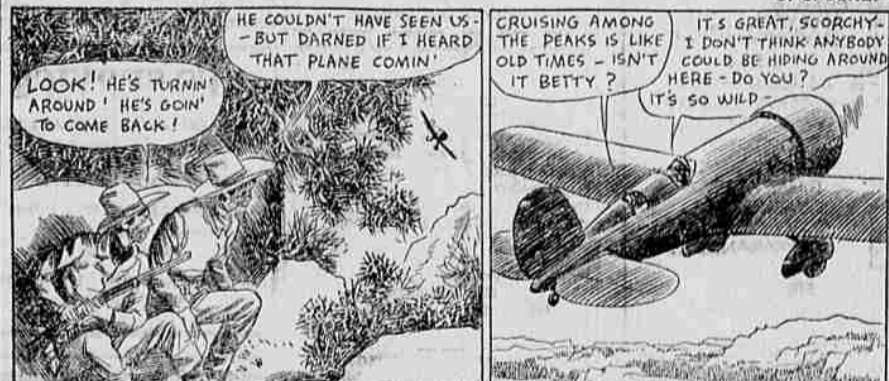

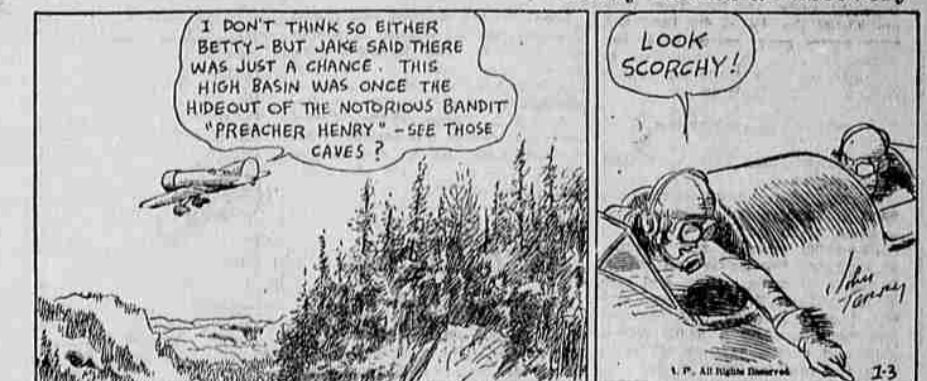

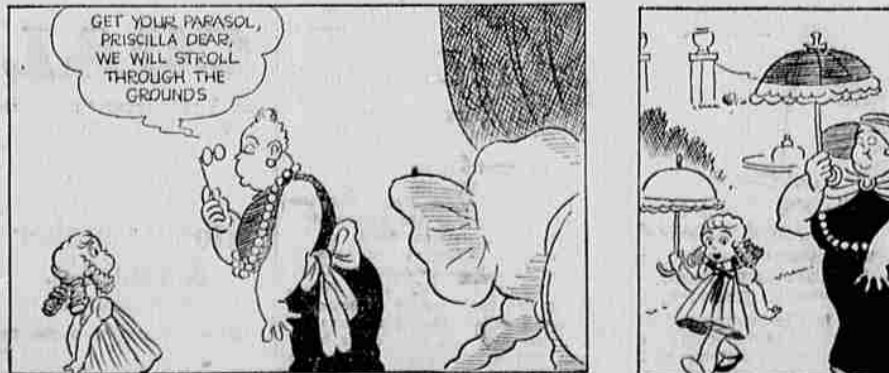
