

QUINN TO LACK EXPERIENCED MEN ON E. O. N. TEAM

None of Regulars of 1932-33 Mountaineer Squad Return to School This Winter.

Coach Bob Quinn has a real job on his hands this winter—building up a winning basketball quintet out of freshman material, the majority inexperienced as far as collegiate basketball is concerned.

"We may have a hard time winning games at first," he said today, "but we hope to have a team that will click effectively before the season is ended."

With a first game scheduled here Friday night against the Boise Junior college, and only this week to work his recently augmented squad, he was not too hopeful about the immediate future. But he remained optimistic about chances of building up a strong combination within a few weeks.

On top of that, Quinn has an unusually stiff schedule, playing some of the top-notch teams in the Inland Empire and in Western Oregon, many of them four-year colleges.

His squad this week includes two lettermen and one member of last year's squad who fell short of making a letter. None of these three were regulars. They are: Louis Halverson, center, Pendleton; Norman Worthley, Commerce High, of Portland; and Cecil Richards, of Cove.

Besides Halverson, he has another prospect for center in Earl Conklin, tall Molalla Ind. Others turning out are Max Baxter, La Grande; Cy Crawford, Corvallis; Fred Peterson, Queen Anne High, Seattle; Frank Beers, Commerce High of Portland; Frank McCully, Joseph; Alden Pix, Echo; Barney Barnes, Milton; Woodrow Damerell, La Grande; Verdell Ragsdale, Baker, and Gilbert Wiley, The Dalles.

Ernie Bredow, star guard last winter and who attended school during the fall term, has not reported and Coach Quinn was uncertain whether he would be in school this term.

Issaquah Mayor Recalled; Woman Rule Not Liked

ISSAQUAH, Wash. (AP) — Someone who wears men's pants is in line for mayor of this little Pacific northwest coal mining town—the voters have had enough of Mrs. Stella Alexander and "woman rule."

She stands recalled, after the voters had harkened to the "Madame Musolina" charges hurled at her by her male opponents. The vote was 200 to 85.

But although in seclusion, she's not downcast. As she puts it:

"Next time I'll go out for a big job. One that pays some money — sheriff or something."

The recall movement started last summer, after she had fired the town marshal, slashed budgets, saved the town money and paid off an old \$893 debt (she said), and otherwise offended the all-male council. Court action was finally instituted, and on general charges of "malfeasance and misfeasance" a recall election won.

Town Clerk R. I. Case, who successfully combatted Mrs. Alexander's suits to block the election, is non-committal about who the next mayor will be, but almost everyone else thinks a man will be named.

"Maybe we'll pick a man, but wait and see," said Case.

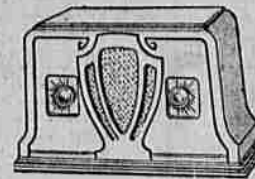
