States Receive \$679,315 Forest Receipts; Oregon's Share \$76,000

WASHINGTON (Special)—Road and school funds amounting to \$679,315 have been allocated from national forest receipts to states in which the national forests are located, the forest service announced today.

Checks totalling \$650,860, which represent 25 per cent of the receipts for timber, grazing privileges, and other products and uses of the national forests during the fiscal year 1933 are to be sent out by the U. S. treasury. An additional \$28,093 goes to Arizona and \$362 to New Mexico for school funds, in accordance with an act of congress of June 20, 1910.

The 25 per cent appropriation of national forest receipts is paid annually to the states in lieu of taxes on national forest lands within their boundaries. Thirty-one states and Puerto Rico share in the distribution of 1933 receipts. The payments to the states will be turned over for local county road and school uses in the counties including the national forest lands.

The grand total this year is somewhat larger than last year, based on a small increase in national forest receipts, but it is less than in years of large sales of timber. Total national forest receipts for fiscal 1933 amounted to \$2,626,049.

An additional fund representing 10 per cent of the national forest receipts will be made available to the forest service for the construction of local roads and trails within the forest boundaries.

Union County Girl Tells of Sumatra

brother, John, one-time world champion buckaroo, died about 1929. He was a resident of Union.

Ever since she was a 12-year-old girl and accompanied her father to Northern Canada to trap and hunt, Miss Spain has set her heart upon seeing the world, she explained. She graduated six years ago from Oregon Normal school, at Monmouth, and is an ex-student of Oregon State college, University of Kansas and University of Arizona. For a number of years she taught geography and history at Tucson, Ariz., saving up enough nickels and dimes to start her extensive globe-trotting study of ethnology. Since then she has worked her way, lecturing and broadcasting to finance her travels.

Starting out in 1929, Miss Spain encircled as much of North America as she could do comfortably. Two years ago she spent much time in Europe. Last year she set out for Asia and the South Seas, visiting China, Japan, the Philippines, Malay States, Siam, Indo-China, Australia, New Zealand and a thousand and one little islands of the East Indies and Micronesia.

"Of all the places I've been," she said, "I like Sumatra best. It is impressive, lovely and primitive. The people are wonderful to study, just as interesting as the Japanese and Balinese. The mountains are rich in gold, the scenery is rugged, and the tropical trees, flowers and animals are beautiful. Sumatra has the most beautiful tigers of all. There are monkeys and orang-outangs galore. And snakes—the most exquisitely-colored snakes you would find anywhere. I don't like them, even if they are beautiful."

Tigers of Sumatra much prefer dark meat to white. If one was so fortunate as to find a black man and a white man together, he would turn his attention to the dark-skinned fellow first.

Sumatran natives, however, are not on friendly terms with their native tigers. They can smell them coming a mile away, according to Miss Spain—and when a Sumatran bodyguard to a pretty American girl smells a tiger, the bodyguard doesn't wait to beg his mistress' pardon for hastily resigning and evaporating into the jungle.

At least that is the relationship between natives and tigers Miss Spain found when she visited Sumatra a few months ago in her studies of ethnology.

Miss Spain said she was on tiger hunts where no tigers were caught although one once stole the dog from
