voted for La Grande and Mr. Gralapp did not vote, although—representing La Grande—he accepted the invitation to stage the tournament. Previous to the meeting, no direct invitations had been extended by either Union or La Grande.

Some years ago, La Grande made an effort to get the tournament and was beaten by a large vote, and at that time it was decided here not to make any further effort to get the tournament. This policy has been followed religiously since that time.

As a result of staging the tournament here, it was necessary to make some changes in sub-districts.

Under the rules now in vogue, the host team is in a sub-district of its own and is not required to qualify for the tournament. So La Grande's Tigers, 1933 champions, will defend their title in the 1934 tournament without going through elimination tournaments.

The new lineup of sub-districts follow, with their committees:

District 1 — Union and Wallowa counties, exclusive of La Grande. Roy Conklin, Union, chairman; J. R. King, Imbler, and O. F. Campbell, Wallowa. Three teams to qualify.

District 2—La Grande.

District 3 — Baker and Malheur counties. Mr. Hollenberg and Mr. Coleman. Four teams to qualify.

Mr. Gralapp was appointed as manager of the championship tournament, and the board agreed to continue the same play of double elimination, with consolation finals for third and fourth places, as has been used in recent years.

If an extra game is required to settle the championship, it will be

played at 8 p. m. Monday, Mar. 12. Drawings for places in the tournament will be made as soon as eight teams have qualified. Usually, this drawing takes place the Monday before the tournament begins.

The question of where and when to stage a sub-district tournament for Union and Wallowa counties to select three teams for the title play remain in the hands of the committee headed by Mr. Conklin.

Locally, knowing that Baker is seeking to convert its natatorium into a modern, standard size gymnasium, it is believed that one motive behind the move to change the tournament to La Grande is that when Baker has its gym completed, the plan there would be to alternate with La Grande.

There is no official basis for the above, however, and it is given only as reflecting "street talk" of an unofficial sort in La Grande today.

NIEDERERS IN LOS ANGELES

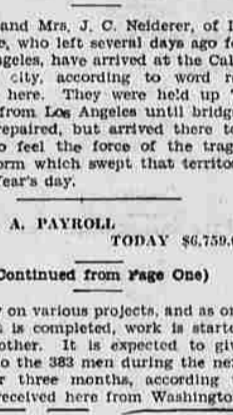

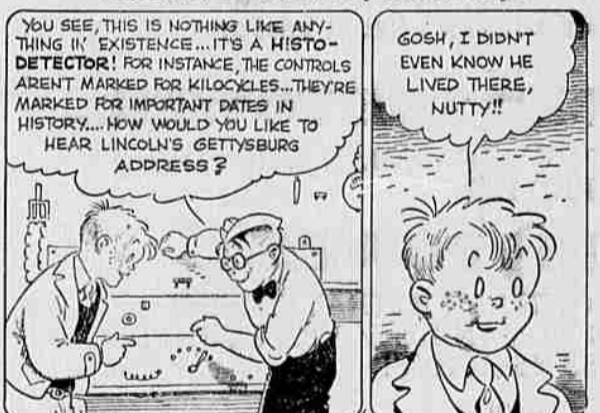
