3 Departments Give Report Of Work at P. T. A.

The meeting of the High school P. T. A. was held Thursday evening at 8:00 o'clock in the gymnasium.

A brief business meeting was held, after which Mrs. Robert Eakin outlined the program for the evening.

The girls' sextette, accompanied by Sylvia Hodgins, sang three numbers, "Nobody Knows the Trouble I've Seen" by Burlingame, "Last Round Up" by Miles, and "Out of the Dusk to You" by Dorothy Lee. Those in the sextette are: first soprano, Winifred Scott and Ella Engel; second soprano, Isabel Williams and Margery Spencer; alto, Viola Rogers and Helen Hendrickson.

Miss Vernon spoke about the languages taught in high school, and particularly about Latin. She explained the methods and devices used to teach Latin, and the results attained. As an example of her work, she presented the play, "Bulla." Lois Hardy described the costumes of the play, and introduced the characters: Pronto, the father, Igon Chadwick; Anila, his daughter, Kathleen Pearce; Lancela, her slave, Patsy Jesse; Thos. Mary Free, and Danya, Patricia Clark, wives of thieves. The play was very well acted, and the speeches were entirely in Latin.

Miss Hattberg and Miss Myers spoke on the value of their subjects: Domestic Science and Domestic Art. Mr. Blunt compared the amount of time given to social science courses in our school with that of other schools. He believes that we should have more time to devote to history and civics, if nothing else. He also talked about textbooks and modern improvements in them.

Miss Osborn briefly explained each gym activity, such as basketball, gymnastics, etc. She said, among other things, that physical education is an important factor in helping girls make necessary social adjustments.

Several announcements were made before adjournment. The next meeting will be on Founder's Day.

Teachers' Meeting Held In Portland

The Oregon State Teachers' meeting was held at Portland on December 27th, 28th and 29th at Lincoln High school.

Wednesday morning was devoted to a business session and to reports by Dr. Howard, state superintendent of education, by President Churchill, director of Normal schools, and by Dr. Jewell, dean of the school of education at the University of Oregon and O. S. C. Superintendent Gould of Eugene and Superintendent Turner of Dallas discussed the proposed sales tax of the state of Oregon.

In the afternoon session on Wednesday reports on the national survey of secondary education were made by representatives of secondary schools. During that afternoon Mr. Gralapp made his report on "Instruction in the Social Studies."

The schedule of Thursday morning consisted of the president's address, a discussion of Oregon's education problems by Mrs. Ketzner, president of the Parent Teacher association of Oregon, and an address by Dr. Frank W. Hart of the University of California, and by Dr. Coleman, president of Reed college.

Thursday afternoon and Friday morning were devoted to sectional meetings and Friday afternoon Mr. Dudley De Groot, of San Jose Teachers' college, discussed physical education. Dr. Coleman followed with the topic, "The Will to Peace." The last address of the convention was by Dr. Hart, who spoke on "The New Deal in Education."

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Paul C. Brown Main Speaker At Assembly

During a special assembly of the La Grande High School Student Body January 3, Paul C. Brown, field secretary of the International Christian Endeavor association delivered an inspiring address.

Principal Gralapp of the High school introduced Doctor MacPherson, of La Grande, who in turn introduced the speaker.

Mr. Brown who has been connected with young peoples' work for a number of years, spoke about the problems confronting the young people of today, and what they must do in order to succeed or carve out a successful career for themselves. Young men or women in order to succeed must segregate themselves from the crowd and direct their life's path toward the mountain heights—that is—over upward; for the crowd drifts, always following the easiest road and the path of least resistance. The forward progress of the crowd is compared to the proverbial "stick in the mud."

Mr. Brown sums up the attaining of character and success in four words—they are: Decide, Start, Stay, Finish. Decision is very essential, for without a decision a person does not move forward in any activity.

Start is absolutely necessary, for without a start the value of decision is lost. A person who stands still is worse than one who moves backward because stationary things tend to take root and become fixed.

Stay is very essential, for the success of a decision and start depends upon staying with the plan being pursued.

Finish is imperative, for the successful completion of a decision—started and stayed with depends upon an appropriate finish.

MR. BLUNT'S SON HONORED BY GERMAN PAPER

Mr. Blunt's son, who is attending Washington State college, has recently written a paper on the "Observation Concerning the Micro-chemistry of the Molecules of Seeds." This is not his master's thesis but just a subject that he studied while taking the fellowship there. For proof of its value a doctor in Moscow, Russia requested a copy of it.
