EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 8 (AP) — University of Oregon's basketball team proved a dark horse of the right color in winning its opening conference game 30 to 27 from Washington State college here last night.

If it should repeat when the two teams meet here tonight, Oregon could boast as many conference victories as it won all last season.

The Oregon five, which included Sophomores Bud and Willie Jones from Ashland Normal, had a five point lead before the dazed Cougars counter-attacked. The Webfoots led 16 to 11 at half-time.

An eight-point rally requiring less than two minutes brought Washington State a 19 to 18 lead in the second half. Robertson's goal put Oregon ahead again but McPhee returned the lead to the northern five.

Oregon maintained the lead after Bud Jones took the ball from Scott in mid-floor, dodged goalward on a dizzy dribble and scored. With smooth, deft passes the Webfoots monopolized possession of the ball and prevented any further Cougar rallies.

McPhee, of Washington State, and Robertson, of Oregon, divided scoring honors with 10 points each.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9 (AP) — MacDonald Smith, a great golfer before some of his present day competitors were born, had the 1934 Los Angeles open championship added to his credit today as evidence that at nearly forty years he still stands high among the game's leaders.

The son of old Carnoustie kept pace with par and outdistanced youth yesterday by shooting a 280 on the rugged Los Angeles country club course to defeat an impressive field by a convincing margin.

Baker Is Given Coast Geodetic Survey Office

BAKER, Ore. — A U. S. coast and geodetic survey office was established in Baker county court house Monday as headquarters of the survey in Union, Baker, Grant, Wallawa, Morrow and Umatilla counties.

The survey is classified as relief work that has to be done. Many of the lines are being placed through the civil works administration. Three hundred engineers are being placed at work in the state running level lines and setting bench mark monuments. The survey is an expansion of the first and second order lines of levels which are already in.

The first level line out of Baker will go to Medical Springs and thence down Catherine creek into Union and Hot Lake. An engineering party of five men is attached to the Baker headquarters.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 9 (AP) — Reports increased on all sides that Harry Kipke and his men of Michigan will be brought in to take over the task of leading Yale university's football forces.

Malcolm Furmer, chairman of athletics, conferred last week with Ivan Williamson, captain and end of the Michigan championship team of 1932. From Pontiac, Mich., came Williamson's statement that he has accepted a post as assistant coach at Yale.

OREGON AT TOP IN INCREASE OF TRUCKS IN 1933

SALEM, (AP) — The state of Oregon led all other states in ratio increase in trucks registered during 1933, a national survey received by the secretary of state showed, and was second in private automobile increases and second for the combined total of vehicles listed. In gasoline sold, Oregon rated eleventh, the survey revealed.

The survey, covering 40 states, showed that in these divisions of the United States a total of 23,000,000 automobiles and trucks had been registered and consumed more than fifteen and a quarter billions gallons of gasoline.

The past year was the fourth consecutive year in which vehicle registration had decreased, while gasoline consumption had decreased the past two years only.

In private vehicle registrations the past year, Oregon was second with a ratio increase of 29.09 on its total of 223,482 cars. New Mexico was first with 53.29. Georgia was third with 33.29. The national figure showed a decrease of 1.66 while Colorado showed the greatest decrease of 14.07 per cent.

In other vehicles Oregon led with an increase of 56.31 per cent. New Mexico was second with 42.13 and South Dakota lowest with a decrease of 17.90. The national decrease was 1.22. The combined totals revealed New Mexico 50.69 increase, Oregon second with 32.30 on its 277,166 licensed vehicles, and Georgia third with 13.21. Colorado was lowest with a 14.03 decrease. The national decrease was 1.60.

Ten states passed Oregon in gasoline consumption the state increase with 121,684,068 gallons was 1.1m the national figures showed a decrease of 1.81 per cent. Florida led in this increase with 6.34 per cent while South Carolina reported the largest decrease of 11.47 per cent.

Japan Trade Bait Offered Argentina By Shipping Agent

BUENOS AIRES, (AP) — Japan holds out to Argentina an annual market for \$17,000,000 worth of wool, wheat, sugar, hides and meat. Ki Iyosaka, agent there for Japanese shipping interests, told Luis Duhan, minister of agriculture.

Visiting the minister before departing for Tokyo to confer on new steps for building up Japanese-South American trade, Iyosaka said commerce with Argentina had been growing rapidly, and pointed out that Argentine wool, needed by Japan's 800 textile factories, is admissible duty-free to Japan.

STOCKS MOVE UP; CLOSING IS FIRM

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 (AP) — Stocks felt better today and, despite the exceptional slowness of trading, leading issues held gains of 1 or more points. The quiet rally followed a revival in the tobacco group coincident with an advance in cigarette prices. Profit taking cut down extreme gains, but the close was fairly firm. Transfers approximated 800,000 shares.

In the course of his talk Mr. Hanford told some of the history of the Old Timers club. Contrary to general belief, this club is not an organization of all persons of long residence in this city, but is a unit of an organization among railroad employees numbering over 6,000 membership in the Union Pacific system. Members must show at least 20 years of service with the railroad. The La Grande club has a membership of around 160.

Tentative Plans Explained
Mr. Hanford went on to explain the tentative plans for the celebration for the three days of next July 19, 20 and 21. Thursday the 19th, he said, would open with a pioneer day celebration and in the evening the coronation of the queen.

Friday, the 20th, will feature a parade in the morning, athletic events in the afternoon with a speaker of national prominence, and in the evening a dance and other entertainment.

Saturday, the 21st, will feature in the morning the finals of various athletic events, in the afternoon the presentation of a pageant dramatizing the story of transportation with over 1,000 persons in the cast, and in the evening an athletic carnival featuring national champions of various sports.

The coronation, athletic events and pageant will be held at the athletic field which will be built to accommodate 10,000 persons.

Letters, bearing a specially drawn seal, and several thousand in number, are to be sent far and wide, to all former residents and to others inviting their presence in La Grande during the celebration.

H. A. Connors, superintendent of the Oregon division of the Union Pacific R. R., was present at this noon's luncheon meeting and assured those present of the wholehearted support of the system in the plans of the community for the celebration.

elections or special sessions of the legislature." Completed petitions would have had to been filed with the secretary of state by January 12, ninety days after the petitions were started.

Federal Income Taxes Are Same As During 1933

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special) — The 1933 federal income tax returns were mailed on Jan. 2, and should reach taxpayers within the week. The requirements for filing individual returns are the same as for the year 1932; i. e., each single person with a net income of \$1000.00 or over and each married person with a net income of \$2000.00 or over, or each person with a gross income of \$5,000.00 or over must file an income tax return.

If separate returns are filed by husband and wife, the exemption may be taken by either or divided between them. In addition to the personal exemption, a credit of \$400.00 may be claimed for each person (other than husband or wife) under 18 years of age, or incapable of self-support because mentally or physically defective, who receives his or her chief support from the taxpayer during the taxable year.

Before preparing the return, the taxpayer should assemble carefully all information; he also should make a study of the instructions on the form. When the return has been completed, all working papers should be held by the taxpayer for future reference.

The oath will be administered without charge by the collector, any deputy collector or internal revenue agent.

Although taxpayers have until March 15, in which to file returns, Collector J. W. Maloney wishes to impress upon each one the desirability of compiling his information and filing his return at an earlier date in order to avoid last minute rush. This early filing will permit all taxpayers to receive the full, courteous assistance Collector Maloney desires rendered by his corps of deputies. Corporations and partnerships are required to file federal income tax returns, regardless of the amount of net income.
