"Rabbit" Curry Back to Gridiron - In Statuary

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Mindful of the mighty things Irvy "Rabbit" Curry did in football before he went away to war and was killed on a French battlefield, Vanderbilt university proposes to place a life-size statue of him on Dudley athletic field.

Old-time gridiron fans and the newer ones, too, never fail to mention the "Marlin Marv" in discussing Vanderbilt's stars of other days.

From 1913 to 1917 the youngster from Marlin, Texas, was the idol of his teammates as well as the grandstand crowds. Although he weighed only 130 pounds, he was, in the words of Coach Dan McGugin, "a very dangerous runner, an excellent forward passer, a good tackler and a great leader." He played varsity quarterback four years and served as captain of the team in 1916.

His body is buried in France - not far from the point where he was shot down in active combat. A lover of excitement, "Rabbit" put aside his football togs when the war drums beat and enlisted in the aviation service. He was commissioned a first lieutenant in the 98th Aero Squadron, First Pursuit Group, and was ordered to the front July 17, 1918.

Less than a month later he was killed. Details of his death never were learned except that he flew beyond the allies' lines to give battle to the German aero squadron known as Richthofen's Circus.

Coach McGugin first suggested the statue and the movement was taken up by V club composed of many generations of Vanderbilt athletes.

"Our hope," said McGugin, "is that we may be able to provide something in the nature of a statue of 'Rabbit' at least life-size. We had many fine men from Vanderbilt in the World war. A large number were from our athletic fields and many of these made the supreme sacrifice. It is my idea that the memorial to Curry

Neighbors told police they saw his wife arrive with him and she was then apparently in good health. When police found her last night she had wasted away to 50 pounds.

When Cerardi was arrested last night, police said he acknowledged keeping his wife locked up, but denied mistreating her. He said he had taken her from a state institution where she had been committed as mentally unbalanced and was keeping her with him "for her own benefit."

Police entered the case late yesterday at the request of Mrs. Cerardi's sister, Mrs. Loretta Regenstruf of the Bronx, who complained that Cerardi had repeatedly refused to allow her to see her sister, and allegedly threatened "to bump her off" if she told anyone he kept her sister locked up.

Prosecutor Lieutenant Nathan Allyn said Mrs. Regenstruf had also informed him that Cerardi had insured his wife's life for \$10,000. Allyn said this information would be investigated today to determine if it had any bearing on the case.

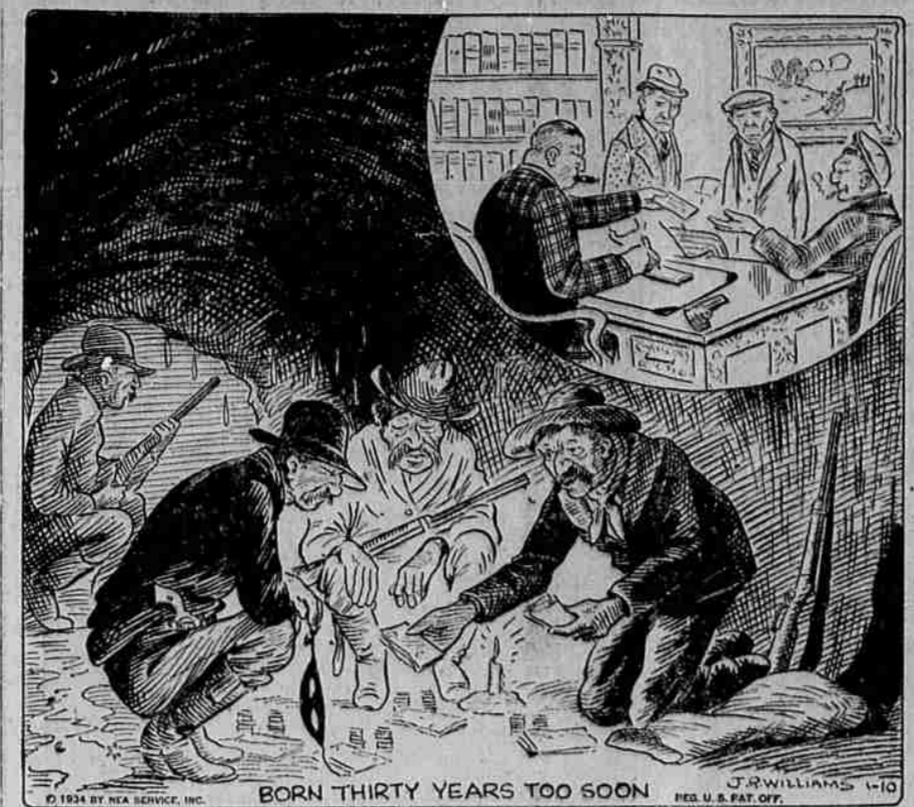

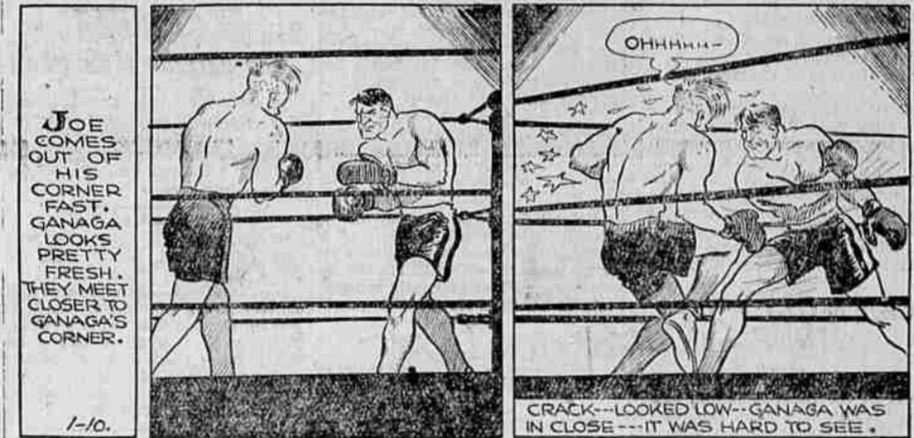
