AT THE LIBERTY

The first great spectacle of modern times, so termed by Cecil B. DeMille, its director, himself the master of spectacles, is now to be seen on the screen of the Liberty theatre where it will run two days. It is titled "This Day and Age," the story of the struggle of the youth of an average community to oust the town's subversive influences, such as racketeers and gangsters, after all efforts of the adult community have failed. To imbue his story with the fire of youth, DeMille has brought together a cast of the more expert young players of Hollywood including Richard Cromwell, Eddie Nugent, Ben Alexander and Judith Allen, one of his own discoveries. Filling the roles of the adult members of the cast are Charles Bickford, Harry Green, Fuzzy Knight, Bradley Page and George Barbier.

The story reaches a masterful climax when the youth of the town, five thousand strong, kidnap the town's leading racketeer, drag him off to an abandoned quarry and there hold a "kangaroo court," using the racketeer's own methods to secure a signed confession. Then, with the racketeer riding a rail, the mob marches back to town, breaks into the home of the judge who originally had acquitted their captive of a murder charge, and force the jurist to witness the signed confession.

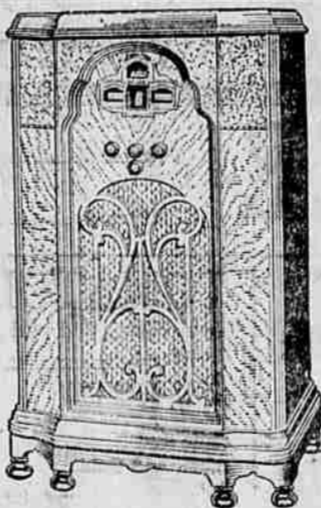

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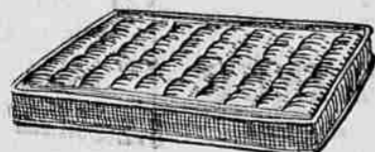
