

### CHANGED LINEUP TO TAKE FLOOR ON E. O. N. TEAM

Working out a new combination which he hopes will give the team additional defensive strength, Coach Bob Quinn left here about 1 o'clock this afternoon with 10 Mountaineer basketball players on a three-day road trip.

Tonight the E. O. N. team play Whitman college at Walla Walla, and tomorrow and Saturday nights the squad will meet Lewiston Normal school at Lewiston, Ida.

Quinn has shifted Worthley, guard, and Crawford, guard, to forward positions, working them with Conklin, center, and Beers and Peterson, guards, during this week, with improved results. Baxter and McCully, forwards who saw some action against Boise Junior college last week, are strong offensive men but so far have been lacking in defensive play, and with colleges generally using the man-to-man defense, it relegated them from the starting lineup for the time being.

If the combination Quinn has now doesn't work to his satisfaction, he is planning further changes next week. Woodell, center of the L. H. S. team last year, is playing as center and guard position; Halverson is doing likewise, and Ragdale is the tenth member of the travelling squad.

Quinn was not very optimistic of any victories on this week's trip, but was expecting his squad to get some valuable experience that will stand his players in good stead later in the season.

In the full spirit of good cheer and optimism, still feeling the glow of their achievements in 1933, the New York Giants look forward to the new season with every confidence in their ability to stay where they are—on the major league baseball park.

The altitude, far from going to the heads of Bill Terry and his companions, seems to have imbued them with a stimulating eagerness to be up and at 'em again. They prefer playing baseball to resting on their laurels. Many of them plan to beat the starting gun that sounds the call to spring training. Opening day cannot come too soon, to judge from the winter reports received at headquarters on Forty-second street, Manhattan.

"There is a team spirit manifest in this Giant outfit that is remarkable," comments Jimm Tierney, the club secretary and a former school teacher whose personal enthusiasm throughout the 1933 season was equal to that of any youngster on the club. "They do not think there was any fluke about what they did and feel they will be even better next season."

### TILDEN SWAMPS VINES IN ELLY'S DEBUT AS A PRO

NEW YORK, Jan. 11 (AP) — Take the word of H. Ellsworth Vines Jr., who sampled the old master's fire for three sets last night, the greatest tennis player in the world at the moment is Bill Tilden, 41 years old and spry.

"There isn't a man in the game, amateur or professional who would stand a chance against him in match play," declared the convinced "Elly" after Tilden had taken him over the humps by scores of 6-0, 6-3, 8-2, in Vines' debut as a professional at Madison Square Garden.

"Fred Perry of England and Jack Crawford of Australia? He'd beat either of them easy, I know about what they can do, and I know what he did to me."

"I thought I'd faced some services but that first ball of Bill's has the others backed off the boards," said the 22-year-old Californian, almost reverently. "It was at that time I knew it, and how it twisted!"

He didn't exaggerate. A few minutes before the crowd of nearly 17,000 that packed the Garden had sat amazed as Vines, a great national champion only two years ago, had tried desperately to stem Bill's thunderous service by bracing both hands on his racket. Even then he couldn't keep it in the court.

After the main set, Vines and Richards came back to trim Tilden and Frank Hunter in a doubles match, 6-1, 6-0.

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Baked Prune Whip  
2 cups cooked prunes  
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
2 teaspoons lemon juice  
4 tablespoons powdered sugar  
4 egg whites  
Put prunes and mash to a pulp. Add lemon rind, juice and 2 table-spoons sugar, blending well. Beat whites of eggs until stiff, add 2 table-spoons powdered sugar and continue beating until stiff. Whip prune mixture by spoonfuls into egg whites. Pile lightly in pudding dish and bake in a moderate oven (350°) for 20 minutes.
