North Powder Man Wins on Wheat At Big Chicago Show

NORTH POWDER—That North Powder grows a superior grade of wheat is now attested by recognition given it at the greatest agricultural show of the world—the International at Chicago.

W. A. Hudelson was advised this week that an exhibit of white Federation wheat sent to the big show was awarded eighth place, and a ribbon accompanied the advice. Wheat from all the famed regions of the world is exhibited at the Chicago show and the local wheat had to be good to be given a prize. It was from field run, although hand-picked, from grain grown on the Hudelson dry land farm east of North Powder.

Federation wheat was originated at the Moro experiment station in this state and has been grown extensively by Mr. Hudelson and others of this district for several years.

C. W. A. Work Up Mill Creek Road Is Completed
