Chats With Parents

LIKE FATHER LIKE SON A boy's attitude toward women throughout his life will be largely influenced by his father. If he sees his father speak rudely to his mother, or laugh at her opinions; if he notices any contempt in his father's attitude, any lack of respect, and admiration, the child is very apt to go through life with the same point of view, not only toward his mother, but toward all women.

If, on the other hand, the father not only respects the mother, but insists that his children and everyone who comes in contact with her express the same respect; if he considers her opinions, and not only acknowledges, but takes for granted the equality between the sexes, which means of marriage a partnership instead of a contest or a protective society, the boy will reflect the joy and freedom of such a relationship throughout his life.

It is essential for a boy to feel respect for his mother if he is to grow into a normal human being. In childhood and early youth she is, generally of necessity, the center of his life, the pattern by whose directions he molds himself. If this ideal is inman, or despised, he is a very poor little boy indeed.

Often, influenced by school mates or by some outside force, there will come a moment when the small boy is rude or defiant of his mother. And it is here that the father can and should interfere very decidedly. Perhaps it will be the boy's first, perhaps his last, but the father and son will have greater mutual understanding and respect for ever after if the punishment, whatever it is, is administered promptly and severely.

(Continued on Page Four) through conversion of cash into bonds. Earlier, Edsel Ford had testified to his father's refusal to extend further aid to the Guardian banks in the frantic hours before the Michigan bank holiday last February.

The confirmed evidence presented to the committee that Ford not only refused to give additional aid to the Guardian banks but threatened to withdraw \$25,000,000 of deposits in the rival Detroit bankers group, if the Guardian banks were closed.

The Ford group already had poured millions into the banks, Ford said, adding they decided "we wouldn't go any farther." Leyburn testified the government had done all it could to save the Detroit banks, and that criticism of the government's part in the situation came from the politicians up there who want to make pawns of the depositors.

The R. F. C. has been accused of being the big bad wolf that came up to Michigan that February morning and closed the banks," he said. "The fact is the government gave every bit of help it possibly could. Most of that talk comes from the politicians up there who want to make pawns of the depositors. I'm referring to present company, Senator Coughlin."
