FIRST WARD FIVE TROUNCES UNION M. I. A. 39 TO 28

The La Grande First Ward M. I. A. basketball team, reorganized this month, won a decisive victory over the strong M. I. A. team from Union in a game played here last night at the L. D. S. Recreational hall.

The final score was 39 to 28, but at half time the score was very close. The visitors, however, were unable to match a determined scoring rally by the La Grander in the last half.

Michigan Nimrod Named Captain Of All-Star Team

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Ned Lilly, of Stanton, Mich., junior sensation of the 1933 grand American trapshooting tournament, was named captain of an annual "All-American trapshooting team" selected yearly by Jimmy Robinson, former statistician of the Amateur Trapshooting association, and announced today.

Lilly won the national clay target championship with 199 out of 200; the junior crown with 100 straight, and tied with Walter Beaver of Pennsylvania for the grand American title by breaking 98 out of 100 from the 24-yard line.

Others named on Robinson's team and their outstanding achievements include:

E. W. "Ted" Kentro of Dell, Mont.—Broke the long run record on handicap targets, with 240 straight from 240 yards.

Belle McCord Roberts, Long Beach, Cal.—Winner of the state handicap title of California with 98 of 100 for 18 yards; won the women's preliminary race at the grand American with 93 of 100 from 19 yards and captured the woman's championship at the California state shoot with 191 of 200.

Frank Troeh, Portland, Ore.—Broke 200 straight to win the Oregon state championship; tied world's record with 344 of 350 to win the all-around crown of Oregon; won his state handicap with 97 of 100 from 24 yards; won three high average titles of Pacific coast last year, the 10-yard targets with .9804 and averaged .9889 to place third at the A. T. A. 1,000 to 2,000 division.

E. F. Woodward, Houston, Texas.—Won the national high average title for 1933 with a world's record mark of .9950 on 1,000 registered targets and won the open championship at the grand American with 199 of 200.

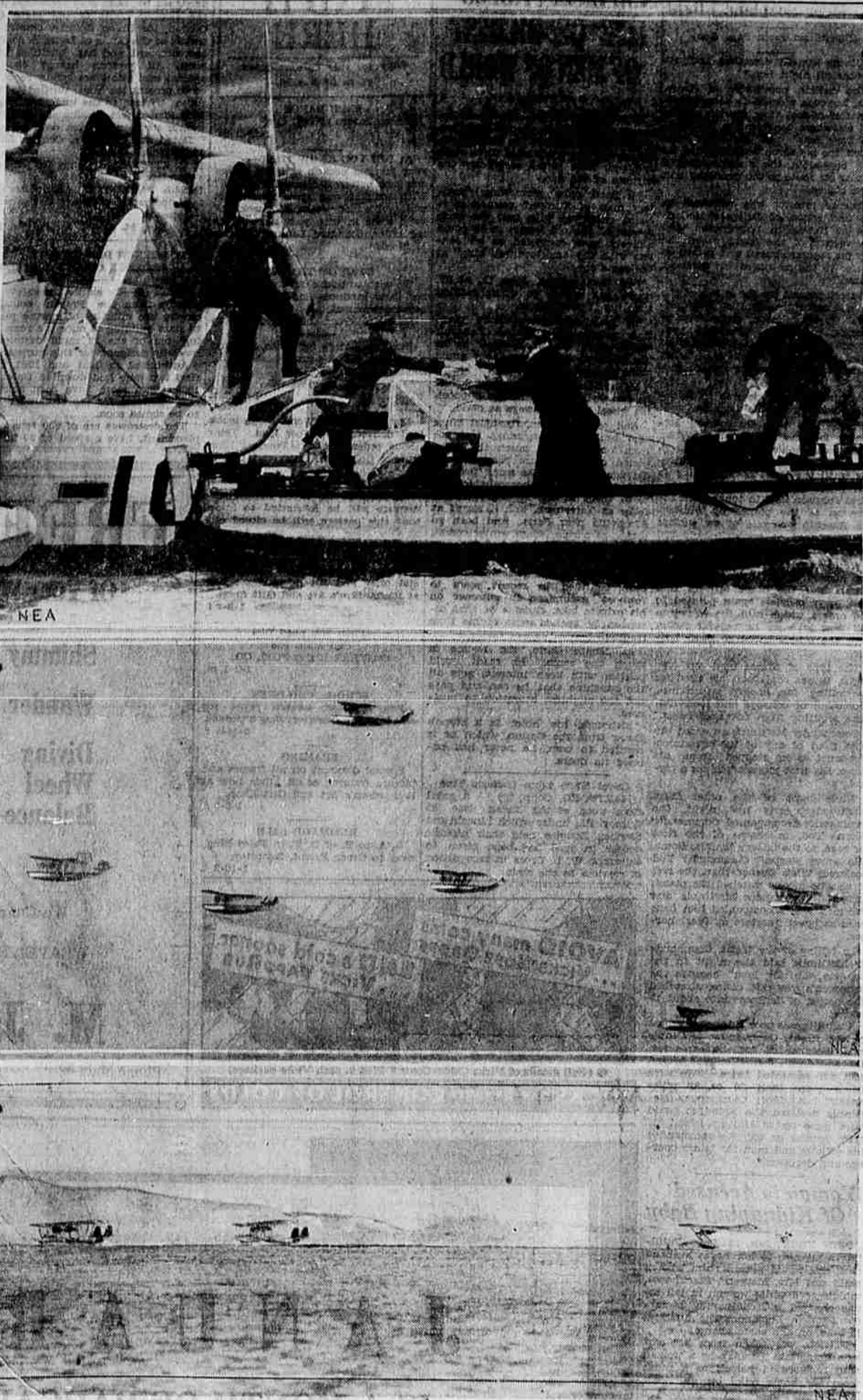

Golf Stars Begin Tournament Play At San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12 (AP)—Golf stars from all sections of the

country, 64 qualifiers from a field of nearly two hundred starters, teed off today in the opening match play round of the annual \$4,000 San Francisco national match play open championship.

The eighteen hole matches brought together as representative a field as ever assembled for Northern California's richest links event.

Professional club swingers predominated but enough crack amateur players survived the qualifying test to make the tournament one of general interest.

John Rogers, long driving pro from Denver, claimed the first share of prize money. He won medal honors yesterday with a score of 70, two under par for the Lake Merced course.

New Coordinator MRS. RHODES RETURNS HOME



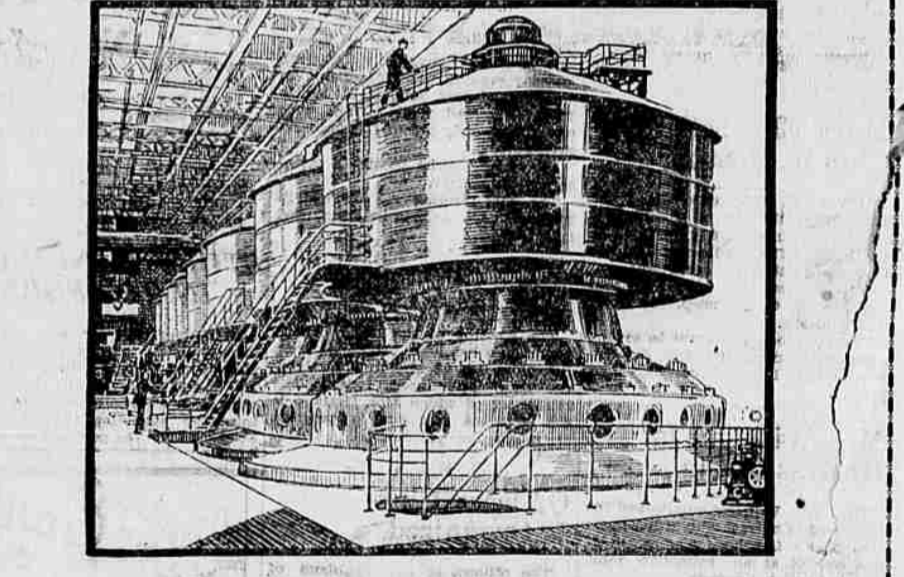
