

ARMS PROBLEM DIMS HOPE FOR BRITISH TAX CUT

 LONDON (AP) — The shadow of disarmament troubles is casting gloom on a picture otherwise streaked with rays of sunshine as John Bull pores over the estimates for next year's budget.

The tax payer's hopes for at least a small cut in his heavy burden, on the strength of a substantial surplus built up in the current financial year, are held from soaring by the feeling that an increase in the defense estimates is inevitable.

Surplus No Relief

That there will be a surplus has already been announced by Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer. Revenue is running about \$50,000,000 more than at the same time last year, while ordinary expenditure shows a decrease equivalent to more than \$250,000,000.

Under the existing law, however, any surplus realized by the end of the financial year on March 31 must be applied to the redemption of debt. The surplus that intimately concerns the tax payer and the economy victim, therefore, is not the realized surplus of the current financial year, but the prospective surplus of the following year.

Estimates of expenditure for next year are now being prepared by the government departments, but the figures will not be ready for the cabinet until the end of January or early in February.

Adjustments in Spring

It is considered probable that the estimates will be framed on the assumption of a continuance in the new fiscal year of the economy forced upon the country by the financial emergency in 1933.

There would be no difficulty, however, in making adjustments after the estimates have been introduced in parliament if, next spring, the revenue outlook should present an opportunity for restoring some of the "cuts."

Increases in the estimates are expected from several departments, including the navy and the air force. An addition of four aviation squadrons is considered likely, while replacement construction in the navy will be more expensive.

Civil Activities Grow

Parliament was warned last spring that the current estimates were the low-water mark of naval expenditure if the fleet was to be maintained at the existing standard of efficiency. Now the clouded disarmament situation has led to an energetic drive in many quarters for building up the navy and the air force.

Some of the civil departments also are expected to require larger appropriations because of the natural growth of their services. No large economies are in sight; the financial emergency claimed all those long ago.

The general revenue situation, however, is believed to be more than equal to the sum total of the increases in the departmental estimates. But that balance won't help the taxpayer.

Falls, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Medford, Pendleton, La Grande, Baker, Albany, Corvallis, Marshfield, Bend, The Dalles, Astoria and McMinnville.

Liquor stocks already are moving to the state, at least three carloads and they will be here within two weeks, it was announced. The \$400,000 made available by the legislature for the commission, will be ample to supply all the needs, it was announced.

'Electric Chair' Idea Used to Kill Bacteria in Milk

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Experiments conducted co-operatively by Louisiana State university and Michigan State college have led two scientists to conclude that electrocution of milk bacteria is preferable to ordinary methods of pasteurization for eliminating bacterial organisms.

Working simultaneously, Professor Alice J. Gelpi of Louisiana and E. D. Devereux of Michigan are convinced the electrocution method is more efficient and that it does not impair the quality of the milk.

The process, as explained by Professor Gelpi, consists of running a continuous stream or column of milk through a rectangular and narrow chamber with carbon electrodes in the side walls. Application of current sets up sufficient heat to reduce the bacteria count about 99 per cent.

Gelpi found reason to believe, after painstaking experimentation, that the destruction of the endospores is due to the heat they develop within themselves rather than heat created in the medium surrounding them.

Seeking to compare the relative resistance of common spore-forming organisms, the Louisiana professor subjected them to a series of laboratory tests involving the ordinary methods of pasteurization and the new electric method. The results obtained were markedly in favor of the new process, he reported.

Paris designers have launched a new fad which takes up with seven eyelets. One has gone still further and launched a green kid shoe, the tab of which is covered with a design punched in eyelets.
