

10 MOUNTAINEERS AND COACH QUINN LEAVE FOR NAMPA

E. O. N. to Play Albion Normal School at 4 p. m. Thursday in College Tournament.

Ten Mountaineer basketball players accompanied by Coach Bob Quinn, left La Grande this afternoon by automobile for Nampa, Ida., where tomorrow afternoon they will begin play in a six-team invitational basketball tournament sponsored by the Northwest Nazarene college and managed by Loren Basler, College of Idaho coach.

The E. O. N. players making the trip were Earl Conklin, Frank Bears, Fred Peterson, Frank McCully, Norman Worthley, Norvin Woodell, Verrell Espada, Cecil Richards, Max Baxter and Cy Crawford.

In the tournament opener at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon Boise Junior college will meet College of Idaho, at 3 p. m. Northwest Nazarene college and Gooding college will tangle and at 4 o'clock the concluding first round game will bring together Eastern Oregon Normal school and Albion Normal school.

All Play Friday Night All six teams will play again Friday evening. Winners of the first and second afternoon games will meet at 7 p. m. losers of the first and third afternoon games will battle at 8 o'clock Friday evening while the loser of the 3 p. m. game will meet the winner of the 4 p. m. game in the concluding Friday evening game at 9 o'clock.

Tournament play will continue Saturday with the championship battle slated at 8:30 o'clock Saturday evening. The final in the consolation bracket will precede the championship game.

An all-tournament team will be selected by officials at the close of play Saturday evening and a beautiful cup will be presented to the winning team. The cup is offered by the College of Idaho.

Four sessions of play are on the tournament slate. Opening rounds Friday afternoon will match all teams with games planned for 2, 3 and 4 o'clock. Three games Friday night and two Saturday afternoon will complete preliminary rounds while final games in both championship and consolation brackets are slated for Saturday evening.

The Nazarene college gymnasium is a splendid place to hold the tournament. Mr. Basler wrote today, "It is a large brick structure of the arched roof style, thus giving the interior plenty of height. A large playing floor gives adequate space for fast clever basketball with plenty of room to work even the most intricate plays. The gymnasium has comfortable bleacher seats that will seat 1000 persons."

Although most teams entered in the tournament will be composed of inexperienced players, indications point to closely matched quints. Most freshman material is included on all squads entered in the tournament, respective coaches say.

LOCAL SHOOTERS WIN 2 MATCHES

The La Grande Gun club rifle team won two out of two matches last week in the Spokeman-Review telegraphic rifle shoot, according to announcements made in Spokane this morning, after tabulations were completed.

The La Grande team turned in a score of 1,361, which was sufficient to win from Chewelah's 1,162 and Medical Lake's 1,260.

As a result of the two wins, La Grande climbed into a tie for fifth place, with four wins and four losses for a percentage of .500.

Enterprise is reported to have an up and coming quintet, and a hard battle is expected, with the L. H. S. team none too sure of a victory. Saturday night the Tigers will play in La Grande, playing the recent game of the season with Cove High. La Grande won with ease at Cove earlier this month.

FIGHT FANS ARE AWAITING BELL ON FRIDAY NIGHT

Twenty-eight rounds of boxing, barring a knockout, will be dished up to fight fans in this section Friday night, at the Saca Jawa arena, by Promoters Martin Fitzgerald and Leo McCarthy. The first four-round match on the card is scheduled to begin at 8:30 o'clock, and from then on until Elmer "Buz" Brown, 124-pound Oregon champion, with headquarters in Portland, meets Jackie Brighton, 127, of Seattle, the ring will be full of flying leather.

Almost as much interest is being shown in the semi-final as the main event. When Jim Museler, 145, of La Grande, squares off against Dynamite Murphy, 140, of Baker, he will be facing a man with whom he fought a six-round draw some weeks ago — and Murphy was coming along stronger with each succeeding round after a bad start. Whether Jim can show improvement enough to hang up a win or not is the question that is exciting local fans.

Brown, of course, is the headliner on the card. He has piled up 23 straight victories since he took up fighting, and has yet to either lose or break even with an opponent. Brighton, more experienced than Brown, nevertheless is on the small end of the odds as the fight approaches.
