(Continued From Page One) well received in Union county and more than 95 per cent of the wheat raisers signed the reduction contracts. In the contracts the farmers who had three litters of pigs in 1932 and 1933 are eligible to sign, agreeing to reducing of hog production 25 per cent. In corn control, which has not much effect on Union county because of the few corn producers, the farmer is eligible to sign for a 20 per cent reduction if he has produced 10 acres of corn. However, he must agree not to increase his other acreage in wheat or other feed crops, his dairy products, and he must not increase the number of feeder pigs for 1934 greater than in 1933.
