W. E. Williams, vice president of the Producers Credit corporation of Spokane, explained the setup of the corporation. It is one of four agricultural credit agencies created by the United States government, all under one head appointed by the president. There are 12 production credit corporations in the United States. The headquarters for the northwest district are in Spokane where a capital of \$7,500,000 is available for this district. The corporation takes the place of livestock loan associations and similar organizations.

The grower will control the credit association securing capital through the Spokane bank. Notes to secure loans will be rediscouted through the intermediate credit bank at Spokane. The association is a means of farm financing through the Farm Credit bank of Spokane.
