Twenty-two foreign plant quarantines are being enforced by the department of agriculture.

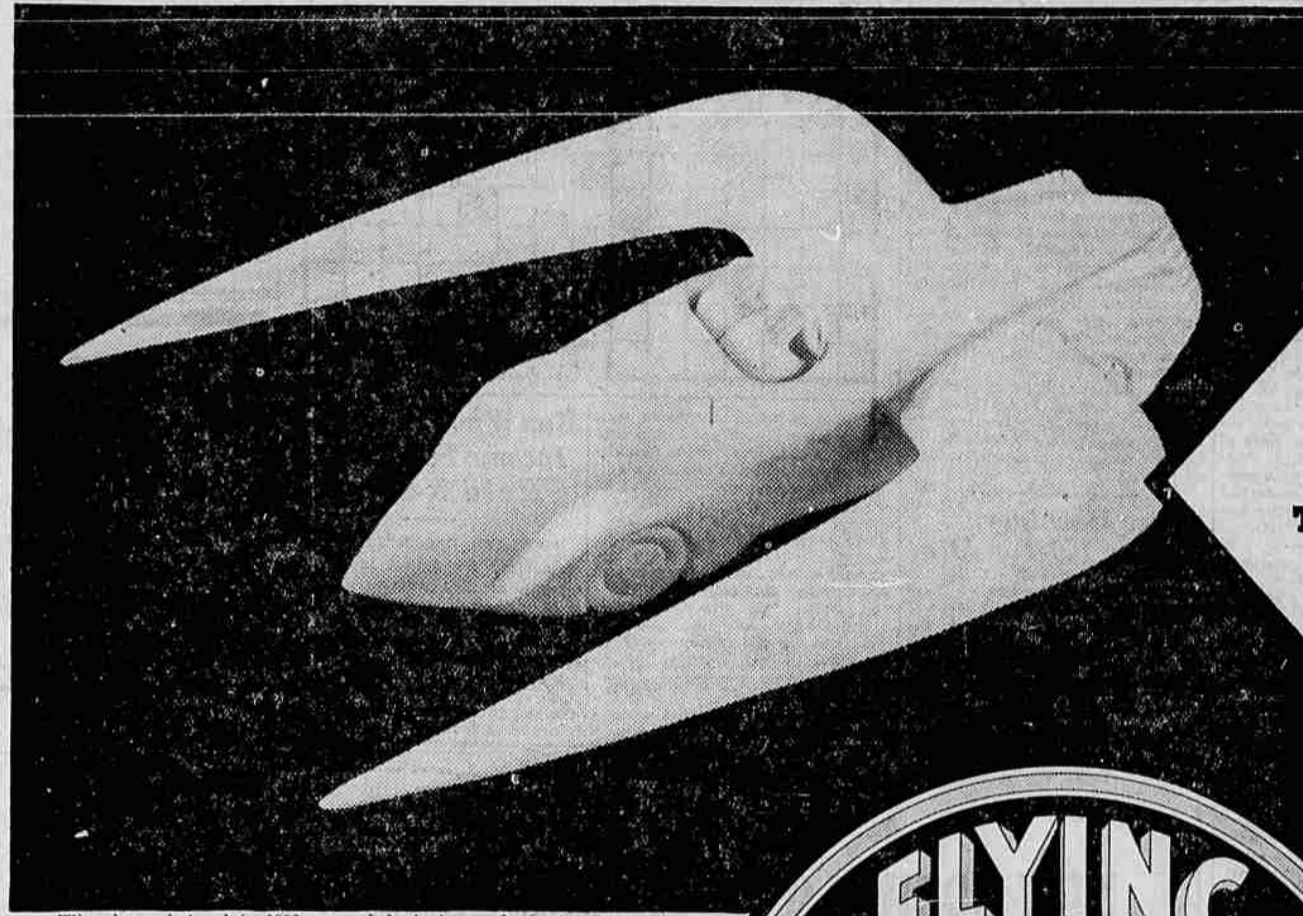
