ANOTHER ADVANCE IN BUTTER PRICE

PORTLAND, Jan. 25 (P) — Further advance in the price on butter was forced during the late session of the produce exchange with the California situation somewhat improved. The market appeared firm despite the liberal increase in offerings from out-of-state points as well as increased in local churning reported by the department of agriculture. Figures of the latter appear somewhat confusing to the trade, as one day there is an acute shortage indicated and the next day the supply is far in excess. On the exchange there was a general advance in the price on cubes, firsts alone being unchanged. The advance in butterfat was 1c and suggested that the market on butter was in good shape.
