CAR INDUSTRY IS COMING OUT OF THE KINKS

Proof that the automobile industry is snapping out of the depression with gusto was offered northwest Ford dealers at their monthly sales meeting by H. H. Wilcox, Seattle branch manager of the Ford Motor Co. He informed the dealers that 1933 Ford sales records had far outdone those of 1932. Seattle branch Ford dealers, including Portland and the state of Oregon, sold over 34,000 more cars and truck units in 1933 than in the previous year.

Wilcox, besides being enthusiastic about the national outlook for the coming year, is also cheered over prospects for the new Ford V-8 in 1934. "I anticipate a 75% increase in sales this year over last," he stated, "and so far January figures bear out my contention, we have sold more units in the first ten days of this month than were sold in the entire month of January, 1933."

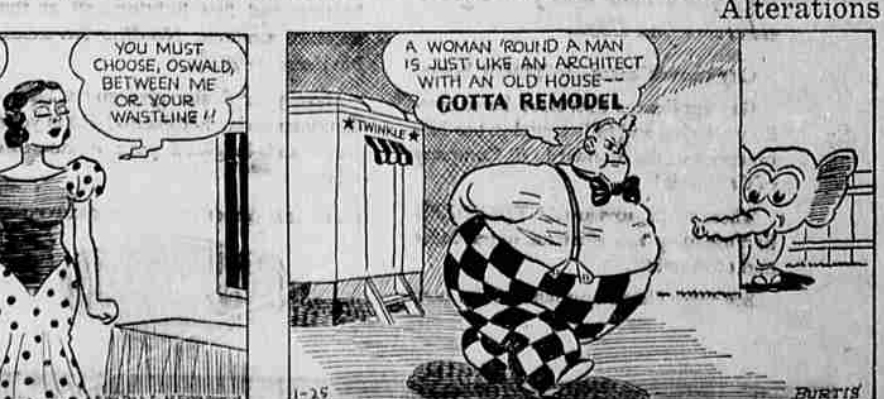

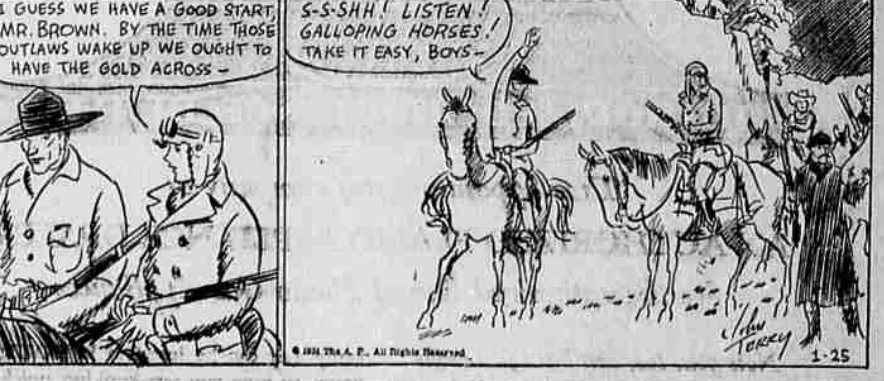
