NEW ADVANCE IN PRICE OF BUTTER

PORTLAND, Jan. 26 (AP)—Advance of 1/2c in the price on first cubes of butter during the late season of the produce exchange completed the picture of the advances started the previous day as a result of the huge quantities of storage butter which are said to be getting too poor to move into regular trade.

Quality of storage butter was said to be unusually poor which has turned much of the trade away from such offerings.

Trading in the egg market here continued erratic with chief interest on the produce exchange in current receipts which were selling relatively higher than the better grades.
