NEW HAVEN, Conn., Feb. 1 (AP) — The appointment of Raymond "Ducky" Pond as head coach of Yale football with a staff of "outside assistants" was commended today by the Yale News, undergraduate daily, as providing "the best coaching consistent with the preservation of Yale sportsmanship."

"Equally important," said the News, "is the fact that the leadership of Yale coaching is still in Yale hands. The introduction of an outside coach would inevitably tend toward proselytizing, a fact that undergraduates and alumni alike consistently ignore."

3 WEATHER MARKS MADE THIS WINTER

any day in La Grande weather records which date back to 1886. The previous high was 59 above in January, 1919, which month also duplicated last month in that one inch of snow was recorded. But in 1919 the minimum for January was even several degrees below zero.

No Snow in January, 1909

One January in local history had no snow, back in 1909. The maximum that month was 52 above and the minimum 12 above. The next best record was in January, 1928, when the maximum was 50, the minimum eight below zero, and the snow one and one-half inches. At the other extreme is January, 1929, when 4 1/2 inches of snow fell.

So January broke the maximum temperature record here and tied with January, 1919, for the runner-up position in snow to January, 1909, when no snow fell.

During January, there were 16 days with the maximum 46 or higher, and 60. Seventeen days saw the minimum no lower than 32 above, with 24 above the minimum for the month.

Precipitation was 2.55 inches, which is 14 of an inch in excess of normal rainfall for the month in La Grande. There was rain on 14 days, snow on Jan. 11, six days were clear, five partly cloudy and 20 cloudy.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 1 (AP) — The warmest January temperature since the weather bureau was established here in 1871 was enjoyed by Portland residents last month.

The average temperature for the month was 47.3 degrees, the bureau announced today.
