

Fellowship Meet Held Wednesday At Local Church

Wednesday evening at the Presbyterian church a happy group of about 150 members and friends met for a fellowship dinner and a program which consisted of piano numbers by Miss Virginia Shepherd, violin numbers by Miss Anita Herman accompanied by Miss Melba Shepherd, and an address by Rev. R. W. Weibel, of Pendleton. Mr. Weibel is Sunday school missionary for the Presbytery of Pendleton and the Presbytery of Grande Ronde.

Mr. Weibel told some interesting experiences of his visits to the isolated sections of his territory, and how successful schools have been established, some of them supporting themselves. Others supported from funds of the Board of National Missions of the church.

Miss Margaret Anson was chairman of the committee on management, assisted by Mrs. Turner Oliver, Mrs. W. B. Pickett, Mrs. Charles Wicklander, Mrs. Joe Williamson, and Mrs. L. A. Kennedy. The Sunday school sponsored the dinner and program. Harold Finlay, superintendent of the school, L. A. Kennedy and Eldridge Huffman served as program committee, and a group of Christian Endeavor young men served coffee.

LOCAL MEN WILL WORK AT OWYHEE

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In each case only men listed on the national re-employment rolls will be used. As soon as all qualified men have been taken from Malheur, the Union county list will be drawn from until exhausted, and the roll in the other counties named will then be used. If it develops that there are not enough highly skilled men in those counties, the Portland list will be drawn from.

A great variety of work will be available on the Owyhee project, calling for gas shovel operators, concrete workers, steel fabricators, carpenters and representatives of other skilled trades. Only those men who are fully qualified for the work will be taken. It was explained at headquarters here that the bureau is required to submit to contractors a working list 25 per cent in excess of the man-power needed, and from this list the contractor may choose men he believes will meet all requirements.

The Oregon headquarters office announced too, that on the Wallowa lake highway job near Lostine, employees will be recruited through the re-employment office at Ontario. After all eligible and qualified workers have been taken from rolls there, the Pendleton re-employment office will be called upon to provide workmen.

The Pendleton re-employment office has both Union and Wallowa unemployed lists. Locally, it is believed that the additional work afforded on the Owyhee dam will more than compensate for any losses through staffing the Lostine job through the Ontario office.

The contract of Hart brothers for the Wallowa job specifies that labor be secured through Enterprise federal re-employment bureau, and that "my first must be taken from Wallowa county. Neither contractor nor highway department have anything to do with the employment. This for PWA work is designated by United States employment service at Portland. It specified the Enterprise bureau for this job and all labor is secured through it, according to word this afternoon from Salem, leaving the question somewhat hazy.
