Second Sermon Of Series To Be Preached Sunday

Several Fine Programs Announced For the Coming Sunday in La Grande Churches.

A number of excellent programs have been announced for the coming Sunday in La Grande. Among them is that of the Episcopal church, Fourth and O, which fol-

lows: 8 a. m. holy communion, 9:45 a. m. church school, 11 a. m. morning prayer with sermon and holy communion.

At this time Rev. Clarence Kopp, rector, will give the second of a series of sermons, titles of which follow: "Who is Man?", "Why Is He Here?" and "How Long Does He Stay?" The final sermon of the series will be preached on Feb. 11.

The musical program follows: prelude "Chant Triumphant" by Gaul, offertory, anthem by choir; postlude "Postlude in B-flat," by Bossi. Young People's Fellowship meets at 6:30 p. m.

Many of the churches in La Grande

are reporting increased attendance of late. Among other programs announced for Sunday are the following:

Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania Avenue) All former records for attendance were broken at the Central Church of Christ Bible school last Sunday when 341 were present at the lesson period. The Women's class made the most noticeable gain in attendance, more than doubling their last quarter's average present. An effort is being made to go past the 350 mark next Sunday. The classes meet at 9:45 a. m. Miss Dorothy Skutts is superintendent.

The morning worship service at 11 o'clock will especially emphasize the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The choir will sing an anthem appropriate to the occasion and the subject of the morning sermon will be "The Communion."

Christian Endeavorers will meet at 6:15 for the regular services of this organization. The monthly concert program will be held. The High School group meets in the basement and the Senior group in the annex of the church.

At 7:30 p. m. the pastor, Rev. Paul De P. Mortimore, will speak on the subject "Prophecy Being Fulfilled Today." "World conditions indicate that a great change in the order of civilization is eminent. The holy Scriptures tell of many of the signs that are evident today. Sunday night we will examine these Scriptures in the light of present day developments," said the pastor, summing up the subject matter which he intends to use. The Christian orchestra has prepared a special prelude concert including "The Heavens Are Telling" from the Oratorio "The Creation" by Haydn.

The public is cordially invited to all of these services.

First Methodist Episcopal Church (Fourth Street at Spring) The increased attendance and the regularity of attendance upon all the services of this church is being noted with appreciation by all those that are responsible for the organization of the program. The words of commendation that are being spoken relative to the effort for "Spiritual Recovery" are themselves an indication of the healthy interest that is being shown.

The church Sunday school is more completely departmentalized than ever, and every department opens with an interesting program of worship beginning promptly at 9:45, so that those who are late in coming may be sure that they are missing something worth while. M. L. Whitney is the general superintendent and is assisted by competent associates in each department.

The morning worship at 11 o'clock is attracting splendid crowds who are deeply appreciative of the excellent music provided, as well as the worshipful values that permeate the entire service. The large chorus choir will provide the anthem at this service and the male quartet is singing the offertory number.

This Sunday is being observed as "Neighbor Day," and each regular attendant is being asked to bring his neighbor to the service. The pastor will speak on the subject "Who Is My Neighbor?"

The Epworth League meets at 6:30 in two divisions and all young folk not in other services for youth are invited to come and share the hour with the League.

At the evening service at 7:30, Miss Mary Eliza Angel is to be the soloist and will provide the special feature of the evening. The pastor will

speak at this service on the subject "In The Beginning."

Island City Community Church The regular services at this church will be as follows:

Preaching and worship service in charge of Rev. Hertog at 9:45. Sunday school at 10:45. Everyone in the community is invited to these services.

Baptist Church (Spring and Sixth) Throughout the world, Sunday, Feb. 4, is "Denominational Day" or "Baptist World Alliance Day." Together with thousands of other Baptist pastors, the pastor will consider in his morning sermon some facts concerning our Baptist heritage. Miss Isabel Williams will play a violin solo as a special number. The service begins at 11:00.

Glenn Fox will be the leader of the young people's meeting. The hour of meeting is 6:30. The hour of the evening preaching is 7:30. The pastor will use as his subject, "Heaven or Hell?" Rev. W. A. Petzolt who for thirty years has been a missionary to the Crow Indians in Montana will speak at the church Monday evening at 7:30. Mr. Petzolt has a thrilling story to tell and the public is cordially invited to hear him. One of the three Crow scouts who served with Custer, White Man Runs Him, bestowed upon Mr. Petzolt the highest honor an Indian can pay another, he gave him his own name. The whole Petzolt family has been adopted into the Indian tribe and given Indian names. Anyone interested in a thrilling story will not be disappointed.

Church of the Nazarene (Spruce and X) Sunday services will be as usual. A special revival service will begin Sunday morning at 11 o'clock and will continue every night except Saturday. Josiah Tucker, evangelist, is in charge.

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington) "Grace is Poured Upon His Lips" is the sermon topic at the 11:00 o'clock service Sunday morning, by the minister, Rev. J. George Wale, will present the "Poverty of Spirit." Thou blind Pharisee cleanse first that which is within the cup and platter that the outside of them may be clean also—Matt. 23:26.

Orders for the year to date were 42 per cent in excess of actual production.
