

OREGON STATERS DEFEAT HUSKIES FRIDAY 25 TO 21

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 3 (AP)—The semblance of a race again sparkled in the north division coast basketball conference today, thanks to Oregon State's 25 to 21 win over University of Washington here last night.

The thrilling defensive battle produced the first defeat of the season for the Huskies, who had won eight conference games. The win left Oregon State, defending coast champion, in what remains of the conference swim.

Oregon State's defense limited Washington to five points in the first half. The Beavers' 18 to 6 half-time lead was boosted to 17-5 before the Huskies found themselves. Then the score was 17 to 15 before the Staters could catch their breath and cling to their lead.

Fast breaks with floor-length passes to Captain Skeet O'Connell brought the Beavers' victory margin. Close checking any place on the floor and taking the ball from opponents featured the Huskies' play and speeded the game.

Sport Slants

The revival of the vogue for playing managers this year in the big leagues, reaching a point where at least eight of the total of sixteen will be full or part-time participants in the active chores, is not entirely due to the economical desire of the magnates to combine two jobs in one for 1934.

This is, of course, a factor to be considered when it is possible to invest a combination of duties in such able workmen as Bill Terry, Joe Cronin, Mickey Cochran and Jimmy Wilson, the newly selected leader of the Phillies, but the trend in baseball players is also a logical application of accumulated talent.

The men now moving into positions of authority, where Connie Mack alone remains to occupy the patriarchal chair, are all products of post-war playing greatness. They form a new generation of leaders, yet to be fully tested but who are well-equipped in experience and ability.

They represent the first major shift to the player-manager idea since Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker, Christy Mathewson and Eddie Collins, to mention a few of the pre-war heroes, tried on the togs of leadership in the closing stages of their careers.

Sophomore Group

The new class in big league managers in effect is a sophomore group, with eight pilots averaging only slightly over a year's experience apiece. The two backstops in the class, Mickey Cochran and Jimmy Wilson, recently classify as freshmen, since they have had no actual managerial experience.

They are counter-balanced by the relatively seasoned part-time leaders, Lew Posen, going into his third year with the White Sox, and Rogers Hornsby, beginning his first full season at the helm of St. Louis Browns, but with about three years' combined managerial experience with the Boston Braves and Chicago Cubs behind him. Posen and Hornsby qualify as "player" managers only because they can step into the pinches with potent bats.

Bill Terry and Joe Cronin, last year's world series rivals, have had only one full season apiece, although Terry laid the groundwork for his success by succeeding John McGraw early in 1932.

Frankie Frisch, who replaced Gabby Street in charge of the Cardinals the latter part of 1933, and Charley Grimm, who was named Hornsby's successor late in the 1932 campaign, complete the list.

Edge in Experience

Cincinnati can swing the balance of power to the playing managers by adopting the new fashion, but not the weight of age.

Connie Mack's 33 years as manager of the Athletics, plus two previous seasons when he piloted the Pittsburgh Nationals, give the bench pilots a dominant margin. One of the youngest of the non-playing managers, Bucky Harris, newly installed in charge of the Red Sox, is entitled to a ten-year service stripe. Veterans like Joe McCarthy of the Yankees and Bill McKeechnie of the Braves, his contract renewed for another five years, help run up the total so that the average span of experience for seven bench managers is around eight years.

A report was received from the presentation of "Box and Cox" and was very favorable.

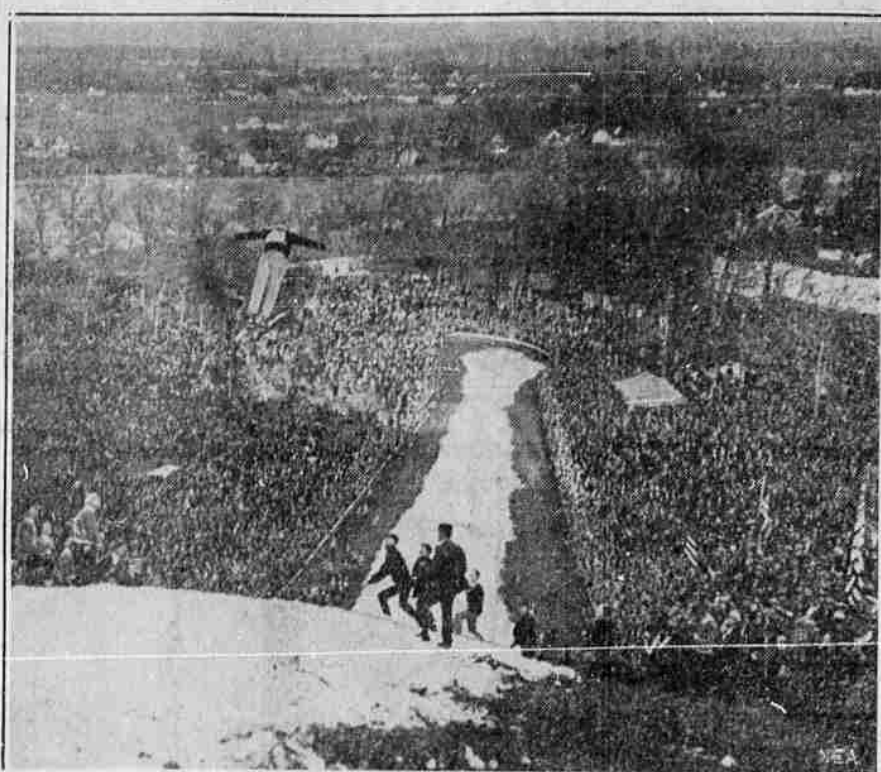
TEAM HOWLS 236 AVERAGE FOR THREE-GAME STRETCH

ISSUE TUITION WARRANTS FOR THE MID-YEAR

The new non-high school law requires the county non-high school board to pay tuition and transportation to all high schools at mid-year. Accordingly, the county school superintendent as secretary of the board, has issued tuition warrants amounting to \$14,084.22. The tuition amounted to \$11,441.28 and the transportation to \$2,642.94.

This is for the first half of the school year. The balance will be paid at the close of the school year. There are 257 pupils attending the high schools from non-high school districts. There are 1067 pupils in the six high schools of the county.

BOARD EXPLAINS REGULATIONS FOR LIQUOR STORES

PORTLAND, Feb. 3 (AP)—A series of regulations for the conduct and operation of Oregon's system of state-owned liquor stores was issued here Friday by the liquor control board. Several of the rules had previously been announced in informal instructions.

The board ruled that no person holding any elective position under the state may be employed by the commission in a salaried position, and that no one under 30 years of age be employed in a liquor store.

A further provision is that no liquor store or agency shall be located within 200 feet of any church, public or parochial school, or face the same street in the same block.

No licensee may maintain more than one location for the conduct of business under one license.

An advertising matter for alcoholic liquors shall first be submitted to the commission for approval, and window or outside displays of any kind of alcoholic liquor, including both beer and wine as well as hard liquors, is prohibited. If this rule is violated cancellation of the license will result, the board declared.

The regulations will be effective as soon as posted in state liquor stores and agencies as provided by the liquor control act.

PLEASE HUNGRY GUESTS WITH THESE PROPORTIONS

If you have decided on scrambled eggs as refreshments for an informal evening party allow an egg and a half to each guest, three strips of bacon, and two rolls apiece. HORSEADISH SAUCE AIDS FLAVOR TO FISH DISHES

Horseradish sauce improves whatever your fish dish may be. And if you find it difficult to get the smell of fish off your hands, a little dry mustard will do the trick. Washing soda in the water helps in cleaning the pan and the utensils you have used in cooking the fish—but do not use soda if your pan is aluminum.

Foreign Markets In a Turmoil Due To Gold Gambling

Foreign exchange markets were kept in turmoil today by feverish speculation and continued shifting of international balances prompted by the new gold value for the dollar.

The dollar had closed in Paris at the equivalent of 6.35 francs to franc, but the French franc declined in New York, getting within .04 of one cent of yesterday's low of 6.22 cents.

The dollar closed at London at 4.83 1/2 to the pound, and the pound later rose in New York to \$4.94 1/2, or 6 1/2 cents from yesterday, but then it quickly fell back to close to \$4.90.

Exchange dealers saw no indication that either the American stabilization fund or the British equalization fund was active, and it was assumed that they were waiting for the situation to quiet down.

PRICE ON BUTTER ADVANCES A CENT

PORTLAND, Feb. 3 (AP)—The price on cube butter advanced 1 cent all along during the weekend session of the exchange with butterfat buying prices up a similar sum.

Even though there was an advance quoted for standard eggs on the produce exchange for the weekend session, no changes occurred on the general market. The co-ops were still naming former values and the general trade was making no changes.

There was an extreme shortage of young chickens and both springs and broilers were higher for the better sorts in the local trade. An advance was again being named on pekín ducks.
