WIDOW CONFESSES TO HIRING YOUTH TO KILL PASTOR

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 5 (AP) — An autopsy on the brain of the slain Rev. Gaylord V. Saunders of Wabash, Ind., may be undertaken to determine truth of his widow's signed statement to police that she paid \$10 to have him killed because his mind was falling and she feared for the lives of herself and her son, aged 10 and 13.

In her statement to Police Chief Michael F. Morrissey, Mrs. Neoma Saunders, 35, said she gave Theodore Mathers, 19-year-old roommate of her husband, the money to hire someone to kill him, but that the youth decided to do it himself.

Mathers, Morrissey said, admitted buying a gun for \$4.50, and shooting Saunders in the back of the head early last Friday morning. The body of the former Methodist Episcopal minister was found in his automobile in front of his rooming house here.

Puneral services for Saunders were held at Wabash Sunday in the church where a week before he had preached his farewell sermon.

Meanwhile Indianapolis police scanned statements of those implicated in the case, and letters of Mathers and Mrs. Saunders, to piece out the bizarre slaying plot.

The widow, Mathers, fellow student of Saunders in an embalming school, and Maail Roe, 19, from Mathers' home town of Coalmont, Ind., who told police he was present at the shooting, are held on charges of murder.

Held, pending further investigation, was Mrs. Mabel Balke, of Wabash, nurse of Mrs. Saunders during a recent illness, who admitted she knew of the murder.

MEXICAN WIVES IN CHINA TO GET GOVERNMENT AID MEXICO, D. F. (AP) — Hundreds of Mexican women who married Chinese and accompanied their husbands to Asia are reported "suffering penalties, miseries and even oppression."

The government has decided to extend special facilities for returning them to this country.

The action was based on consular reports saying that the women and their children, for the most part, were living in poverty and that many of them had been abandoned by their Chinese husbands.

Peasant Finds Horn Of Plenty LE PUY, France (AP) — A real horn of plenty was found by a peasant in an ancient building at Rosieres. The horn, that of an ox, was hidden in a secret cupboard in a window corner and contained gold and silver coins of the 16th century.

Urges Kidnap Firing Squad

By Howard W. Blakester (Associated Press Science Editor) BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — Ballistic experts here have a new, square-headed projectile which goes contrary to the accepted laws of streamlining.

It is a rifle bullet which can be speeded up by 120 miles an hour—200 feet a second—through use of its extra resistance to the air. It is an exception, moreover, that it expected by ballistic men to prove the rule that top speeds lie in streamlines.

The bullet is lead, .22 caliber, and sawed off across the tip. But the tip is not an entirely flat plane. Stuck on its surface, like a sealing wax stamp, is a small, circular plateau of lead, a low projection called the tip.

May Be Made Speedier The experts think this projection has something to do with the speed of the bullet. It may be a partial streamlining, they say, and if it is they expect some day to be able to round it up into the conventional blunt form to secure possibly more speed.

The extra velocity of the new bullet comes from the use of more powder, and the fact that it maintains its accuracy when fired with the extra charge. The conventional shape of bullet would take the higher speed, but would lose accuracy.

The flat top adds accuracy and hitting power. In increased hitting power the tiny, flat surface is said to be equivalent to slapping water with the open hand instead of poking a finger into the liquid.

The bodies of gas animals, being largely water, are hit with such extra force as to knock them over. The ordinary .22 bullet frequently pierces an animal completely without stopping its flight.

Drills a Clean Hole This caliber is used more for target practice than for hunting, and the flat nose makes a perfect round hole in target paper. When two conical .22 bullets strike within a fraction of an inch in the same spot in the bull's eye, even the experts have difficulty in deciding whether they were one or two hits.

The flat tops leave no chance for uncertainty, for their spin makes a precise cutting edge of the blunt end and drills a perfect sphere. "Not only in paper but in anything this bullet is capable of piercing its entering hole is round and clean."
