EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 5 (AP)—Bearing battle marks and some aging clipplings about eight consecutive wins, the University of Washington basketball team met the University of Oregon here tonight and tomorrow nights.

Eight victories will not win the coast conference north division championship, no matter if they were scored in a row. The Huskies were irked when Oregon State defeated them Friday. Bewilderment more nearly described their plight after Saturday's abjecting.

It will take 11 or 12 victories to win the championship, possibly a playoff to boot.

It will be a battle of ambitions tonight, with the Webfoots striving to avenge their Corvallis rivals and remain in the championship swim by defeating the leaders.

In Saturday night's game Oregon State led all the way to defeat Washington 28 to 18. Coach Slat Ollila's men have finally commenced playing as a team unit. Their stand and effective whittling of the Huskies' lead are reminiscent of last year when the industrious Beavers rallied after they had lost four, and swept to the championship.

Galer Gets Points

Bobby Galer, Washington high-scoring forward, was the bright light for his team, scoring 10 points, which with his nine the previous night gave him 106 in 10 games. He leads the league by a good margin.

Meanwhile, on Saturday night, the University of Idaho Vandals won their second out of two games played this year with Washington State, 33 to 27, on their home floor, to move into a tie with Oregon in the league standings for third place.

Chicago Bears Win In San Diego, 7-0

SAN DIEGO, Feb. 5 (AP)—The Chicago Bears, professional football champions, have yet to find a team on the Pacific coast that can take their measure.

The Bears played the All-Stars of Ernie Pinckert, former halfback star of the University of Southern California, here Sunday, and won, 7-0. Though the All-Stars lost, they had the satisfaction of holding the Bears to the smallest score rolled up by the professional champions in the coast tour.

CUNNINGHAM WINS MILE IN 4:11.2

NEW YORK, Feb. 5 (AP)—America's premier millers still are trying to find out just how fast Glenn Cunningham is.

The easy fashion in which the powerfully-built Kansan defeated Gene Venke, Pennsylvania flier, in the Wanamaker mile of the Millrose A. A. games Saturday night left no doubt that he is quite definitely Venke's foot-racing master.

His time, 4:11.2, represented the second fastest mile ever run indoors, beaten only by Venke's record of 4:10, but Cunningham finished with so much in reserve there seemed no way accurately to estimate his speed were he to be pressed to the utmost.

at the court house. The sum of money expended, however, is no index to the amount of aid dispensed. It is said, since government commodities also are distributed.

The commissary, which has been conducted by the county relief committee, is being closed as soon as the material there now is used. Requisitions will be made directly on the stores for groceries.

Many families in the county are receiving wages from C. W. A. jobs and the burden is thereby lightened somewhat. Through the county case workers, who investigate all cases of indigence and destitution in the county, everyone is being taken care of now and there are no families anywhere in Union county that are suffering from dire want as far as members of the committee are able to ascertain.

General Martin Will Seek Governorship

Thomas L. Turner, owner of the Portland baseball club, has seriously announced his intention to run on the same ticket. There has been no indication whether Governor Julius L. Meier will or will not run for reelection.

Martin's formal statement said: "Responding to repeated and urgent requests of friends—both Democrats and Republicans—from all parts of the state, I have finally decided to enter the primaries as Democratic candidate for governor of Oregon."

"I shall," he continued, "erect a standard of good government and call to my side forward-looking men and women. I believe he serves his party best who serves his people best."

Among those on the Democratic side who may attempt to obtain the congressional post General Martin is vacating, are Bert E. Haney, former congressman; Dr. E. T. Hedlund, Multnomah county chairman; Circuit Judge Hall S. Lusk; Jefferson Myers, for years a member of the United States shipping board; Nannie Wood Haneyman, active in the fight for repeal of prohibition, an intimate friend of President and Mrs. Roosevelt; John P. Beckman, state representative and leader in the anti-prohibition battle; Estes Snedecor, Portland lawyer, and Alfred P. Dobson.

Republicans who have been considering entering the race for congress in the third district include Wilber Henderson, county chairman of the party; Floyd J. Cook, former chairman; Circuit Judge W. A. Eckwald; Allyn Bynon, state senator, and Homer Angell, who opposed General Martin for the congressional seat in the last general election.

BULLISH FORCES BRING BIG DAY IN STOCK EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, Feb. 5 (AP)—Piling up their largest volume since last July, stocks stormed through another bullish session today although they met enough late profit-taking to reduce their extreme gains of \$1 to \$4 a share.

Turnover approximated 5,000,000 shares, a rate of a million shares an hour. The bond market maintained last week's activity as many issues got to the highest levels since the summer of 1931.

Commodities were generally firm, though wheat closed under its highs which represented gains of around a cent a bushel. Cotton reached its best levels since 1930.
